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MAGNA CARTA AT USI. "Roads to Liberty: Magna Carta to the U.S. Constitution" -- a major exhibition of rare and historic documents including the 772-year-old Magna Carta, the 1787 Pierce-Butler draft of the U.S. Constitution, and an original Declaration of Independence broadside -- will be on exhibit Thursday and Friday, April 23 and 24, at the USI Physical Activities Center. Admission to the exhibit is free. Student bus tours are being accommodated between 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. each day, with the schedule nearly full both days. Public hours for the exhibit will be 1:30 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, and 1:30 to 6 p.m. on Friday. If the wait to view the exhibit becomes excessive, the line may be closed earlier than announced.

The Magna Carta featured in the exhibit is one of only four copies remaining from King John's 1215 A.D. signing at Runnymede, England. It is the first document to identify and guarantee the rights of the individual and a forerunner of the U.S. Constitution. The document is on loan from the Lincoln Cathedral in Lincoln, England, where it was deposited after the 1215 signing. Other items in the exhibit include the Brasher Doubloon, the first coin minted in the U.S.; significant 18th century newspapers, including the Pennsylvania Packet's first public printing of the U.S. Constitution; first edition books; and engravings reflecting the colonial period in America. Facsimiles of the Mayflower Compact and the Articles of Confederation also are displayed. A special Indiana display of original documents and maps will focus on Indiana's progress from territory to statehood. Items of significance in southwest Indiana will be added during the two-day showing at USI.

"Roads to Liberty" was organized to commemorate the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. The exhibit is a joint project of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, the U.S. Constitution Council of the Thirteen Original States, and American Express Company, which has underwritten the exhibit. In Indiana, it is being sponsored by the Indiana Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. The mobile exhibit was designed by the Smithsonian Institution. It is housed in a 40-foot trailer, which is climate controlled and accessible to wheelchairs. USI will be the last stop in the exhibit's tour of the six Northwest Territory states (Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana). "Roads to Liberty" also will be on exhibit for one week each in the 13 original states, beginning in June.

MAGNA CARTA TRAFFIC CONTROL. Mr. John Klingelhoefer, supervisor of the Physical Plant and Security, urges all students, faculty, and staff to make arrangements for carpooling or walking to campus, if possible, for the two days of the Magna Carta Exhibit. To deal with the expected high-traffic levels -- more than 3,000 visitors are expected each day -- the following measures have been undertaken:

1) The Sheriff's Department will direct traffic entering and exiting the campus from Highway 62.

2) The Civil Defense will direct traffic on campus, to and from parking. Students, staff, and faculty will be directed, in order of priority, to Parking Lots A (north), B (central), and C (south); visitors will be directed in priority to C, B, A, then to temporary "overflow" parking.

3) One bay of Parking Lot C (south) near the main entrance to the Physical Activities Center will be reserved for bus parking.

**CELEBRATING THE HUMANITIES -- VISITING ARTIST.** Dr. Franz Schulze, art educator, critic, and historian, will be a "Visiting Artist" lecturer in the "Celebrating the Humanities" series and also serve as juror for this year's Student Art Exhibition. Dr. Schulze, Hollender Professor of Art at Lake Forest (Illinois) College, will present his lecture, "Chicago and the Rise of the Skyscraper," at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 16, at the Atheneum in New Harmony. A reception will follow at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art.

The Student Art Exhibition will open with a reception from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, April 19, at the University Center, with the student awards to be presented at 2 p.m. The students' work will remain on display from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. through Monday, April 27.

SWISS MANAGEMENT EXPERT TO SPEAK. Dr. Knut Bleicher, a Swiss management expert who will be director of the International Business Forum at Indiana University, will be a guest lecturer at 12:30 p.m. Thursday, April 16, in Forum III, sponsored by the USI Division of Business. His topic will be "Comparisons of Managerial Cultures in Japan, Germany, and American Corporations." The public is invited to attend. Dr. Bleicher has been director since 1984 of the Institute for Management at the University of St. Gallen, Switzerland, the most recognized school of management in Europe. He recently conducted a comprehensive international research project comparing the structure and practices of the American one-tier board system with European two-tier structures in management and supervisory boards. The results of this project, which encompassed interviews with about 130 organizations in various countries, will be brought to bear on revised German corporate legislation.

Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was senior author of a paper presented April 11 at the meeting of the Eastern Psychological Association in Arlington, Virginia. "Children's Memory for Enactments and Descriptions of Naturalistic Events" was the first Gehring/Toglia paper on children's learning and memory. It showed that, like adults, elementary school children can recall more silent pictorial enactments than verbal descriptions. Unlike adults, the children did not show faster forgetting of verbal descriptions between immediate testing and testing one week later.

Dr. Charles Petranek, professor of sociology, recently presented a paper on a simulation that he developed, called "Hospital: Doctor-Patient Simulation Dealing with Terminally Ill." The paper was delivered at meetings of the Allied Health Sciences and Life-Threatening Illness, held at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center, Columbia University, New York. Several medical and nursing schools will adopt the simulation into their curriculum.

Mr. Curt Uebelhor, assistant director of the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, recently was a juror for the Ohio River Arts Festival and had his own work juried into the Annual Water Tower Exhibition at Louisville, Kentucky.

Ms. Connie Weinzapfel, director of the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, was chosen by the Indiana Arts Commission to serve on the Visual Arts Panel which gives a quality ranking to grant applicants. In addition, Ms. Weinzapfel will serve on the panel to select Individual Artist Fellowships in fine arts for the Indiana Arts Commission in late April and will be a judge for the Congressional Art Competition for school children.

A chapter of the Golden Key National Honor Society has been organized at USI, with 92 charter members inducted at a ceremony Sunday, April 12, at the University Center. The Honorable Randall T. Shepard, new chief justice of the Indiana Supreme Court, was the keynote speaker and joined Dr. David Rice, USI president; Dr. Daniel Scavone, professor of history; Mr. Barry Schonberger, director of Student Activities; and Mr. Albert A. Woll, honorary member of the USI Board of Trustees, as the first honorary members of the new Golden Key Chapter. Dr. Scavone also is chapter advisor. USI STUDENT'S PAPER WINS SECOND. Mr. Rodney S. Jackson, a junior majoring in electrical engineering technology, was awarded second prize of \$150 in the Institute for Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) Southeast Region student paper contest in Tampa, Florida, last week. His paper, entitled "An Emergency Warning Device for Firefighters," describes an electronic communication system which would allow commanders to communicate emergency warnings to individual firemen engaged in firefighting operations. The need for such a system became evident to Mr. Jackson during his work as a volunteer firefighter with the Knight Township Volunteer Fire Department. He has constructed and tested a prototype of the system.

Students from electrical engineering and electrical engineering technology programs in 12 southeastern states met in Tampa as part of the IEEE's Southeastcon '86. Mr. Subash Desai, associate professor of electrical engineering technology, accompanied 11 USI students to the three-day meeting. In addition to the student paper contest, the students attended technical sessions, met with students from other universities to discuss student club programs, and participated in a hardware contest.

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From the Congressional Calendar of the U.S. Constitution Bicentennial:

This week in history -- 1787 -- Alexander Hamilton tried to increase the New York delegation to the Constitutional Convention from three to five; Georgia Governor George Mathews named delegates to the Constitutional Convention; William Blount told John Gray Blount that "much is expected from the Convention;" Benjamin Franklin wrote Thomas Jefferson that the Articles of Confederation were "generally thought defective;" Mass Gazette printed preface of John Adams' book, <u>A Defence of the Constitutions</u>; Maryland legislature agreed that each house should elect five delegates to the Convention; James Madison wrote that as the Convention approached, "the more I tremble for the issue."
