He is producing a definitive study on the future of telecommunications and his next book will deal with technology and policy in the public sector and the corporate world.

Genetics and bioethics to be USI lecture topics

The USI Biology-at-the-Interface series will present two nationally-known scholars in early April lectures on genetics and bioethics. The event will honor the 75th birthday of Dr. Margery Shaw, former director of the Medical Genetics Center at the University of Texas, Houston, who has retired and returned to her native Evansville to live. She was honored with the conferral of an honorary Doctor of Science degree at the 1986 USI Commencement.

The lectures at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 2, in Mitchell Auditorium will feature Philip Reilly, J.D., M.D., president and CEO of Shriver Center for Mental Retardation in Waltham, Massachusetts, and Mary Faith Marshall, Ph.D., director of the Program in Bioethics at the Medical University of South Carolina, Charleston.

Dr. Reilly will discuss "The Genetics Revolution: What Does It Mean For You?" focusing on the impact of gene discoveries on the patient-doctor level of medical practice and on a person's opportunities for insurance and employment. Dr. Marshall's topic will be "Situation Ethics Revisited: A Perspective on Current Bioethical Dilemmas," focusing on substance abuse by the pregnant woman and on end-of-life decisions.
