Communications have been established with the Computer Center staff on the Terre Haute Campus in order to maximize the administrative, academic and research computer capabilities on the Evansville Campus.

**PSYCHIC TO ENTERTAIN.** Gil Eagles, "the entertaining psychic", will be performing in the Pyramid Lounge today at noon. A lunch-time teaser will give the entertainer an opportunity to display his psychic powers to the students. In a second performance at 8:45 this evening in Room A126, the psychic will demonstrate his wit, personality, and astounding mental control.

Through recent television and concert-platform appearances, Mr. Eagles has established himself as America's foremost entertaining psychic and hypnotist. Both performances are open to the public and sponsored by the ISUE Student Union Board.

**ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGISTS MEET.** The first annual Engineering Technology Leadership Institute, begins today on campus. Technologists from throughout the United States are expected to attend. The Institute will provide a forum for discussion of problems and/or concerns of mutual interest to engineering technology administrators.

Four major speakers will conduct sessions throughout the Institute. Dr. J.P. Lisach, Director of Manpower Studies at Purdue University will lead off the Institute with "Leadership Through Objective management system for engineering technology education." The other speakers are Dr. Terry Brooks of Memphis State University, Mr. John Wilkie, an Evansville consulting structural engineer, and Mr. Sam Pritchett of the Manufacturing Technology Department of Purdue University.

ISUE is the host institution for the Institute.

**PEOPLE IN THE NEWS.** *BARBARA J. MARTING*, Professor of Business, attended the three-day regional meeting of ALTRUSA in Owensboro on October 8-10. She also was the morning speaker on "The Role of Women in Politics" on October 16 at the Ramada Inn.

On October 8, *CHARLES T. BARBER*, Associate Professor of Political Science, attended the bicentennial year meeting of the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences at Franklin College. He was elected to serve as one of the Directors of the Academy for a three-year term, 1976-1979.

*TOM BROWN*, Supervisor of Radiologic Technology and Instructor in Radiologic Technology, was elected counselor to Zone 3 of Indiana in the American Society of Radiologic Technologists. In this capacity he will coordinate continuing education for radiologic technologists in Southern Indiana with the American Society.

*JAMES D. MAY*, Director of Media Services, has been named the 1977 Media Fair Coordinator for District VIII. Media Fair is an annual statewide event promoting student-produced media programs. The District Media Fair is open to elementary and secondary students and will be held at ISUE on April 16, 1977. Local winners will then compete at the State level on May 6. Categories include photo-essay, audio and video tape, slide/filmstrip, transparencies, and multi-media.

On October 7, *RICHARD MUSSARD*, Associate Professor of Philosophy, participated in a panel discussion on The Philosophy of Creativity. This was part of The Bicentennial Conference on Creative Interchange in the Life of the Nation (October 7-10), which took place in New York and was sponsored by the International Federation of Philosophical Societies and the Foundation for Creative Philosophy. Professor Mussard also served as moderator of a workshop session on the importance of Creative Interchange for Public Media.

*JANE FOLLIS*, Instructor in English, spoke on "Carnival Glass--The American Phenomenon," to the United Methodist Women of Blue Grass Church on Monday, October 11.

**EMPLOYEE BENEFITS INFORMATION,** A recent change in the premium for the University's Major Medical-Dental policy carried with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, has resulted in the University increasing its share of the cost, thus improving an employee benefit. As a result, the University contribution changed from \$6.02 to \$7.90 per month for family Major Medical-Dental and from \$2.42 to \$3.18 for single Major Medical-Dental with Blue Cross/Blue Shield. The employee's contribution remains the same.

REPORT ON PROGRESS AND EFFECTIVENESS  
OF THE UNIVERSITY AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PROGRAM

It is required by the Affirmative Action Plan of Indiana State University Evansville that its director issue an annual report for the purpose of evaluating progress and effectiveness of the program. This report allows comparison with figures for September 1975 and reflects status of employment and placement of full-time women and minority groups.

There has been some progress toward goals and the Affirmative Action Program continues to be generally equitable and effective.\* This progress is shown in part by comparative percentages for women employees. The percentage of women has increased over the past year in faculty and technical/paraprofessional groups, remained the same in administrative and secretarial/clerical categories and declined only in the service-maintenance sector.

On the other hand, the percentage of minority persons in faculty, technical/paraprofessional and secretarial/clerical groups has declined while remaining the same in the other two groups -- administrative and service/maintenance.

\*Noteworthy instances of progress:

- A woman faculty member was promoted to supervise and administer an ISUE academic area.
- A woman was selected for a newly created administrative position.
- Eight of 19 new faculty persons (42%) are women, continuing a high-percentage trend begun one year earlier (four of 10 or 40%).
- A minority person (male) was promoted to another administrative position.
