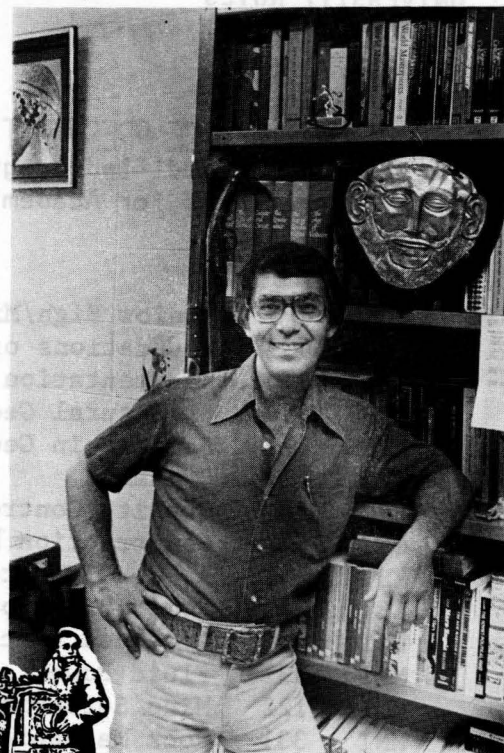

EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT. DR. DANIEL SCAVONE'S favorite topic is the Ancient World, and he has fulfilled this interest by traveling to Greece, Italy, Turkey, and along the western Mediterranean coast. In many of these countries, DR. SCAVONE has delved into the research of the different antiquities in each area. With this research and his personal enthusiasm, he brings to life the history of these countries in his classes.

One topic DR. SCAVONE is currently researching is the mystery of the Holy Shroud of Turin. The Shroud, a 13 foot length of linen, has been preserved from antiquity for more than 19 centuries. The front and back imprints of a human body and the stains of crucifixion are clearly marked (due to ointments, blood, and sweat) on this piece of linen. A controversy revolves around the question of whether through various tests this shroud can be linked to the burial of Christ. At this time, authorities of the Catholic Church have released the Turin Shroud in order to run carbon-14 tests for confirmation of age and neutron tests to see if traces of pollen from Israel are evident. SCAVONE says, "that while internal evidence is powerfully in favor of identification of the Shroud as Christ's, tests will probably never produce positive proof." A National Convention of Shroudists is being planned for May, 1978 in Turin, Italy. DR. SCAVONE is hoping to attend, as he has been exchanging correspondence for 5 years with other enthusiasts about the authenticity of the shroud.

Besides his interest in the Turin Shroud, DR. SCAVONE has explored the myths of Atlantis and the history of Count Dracula of Wallachia. His purpose is to attempt to reveal both the folklore and historical aspects of these famous stories. One of the Student Union Board's most popular events at Halloween time is DR. SCAVONE'S lecture (complete with Dracula mask and slides) on the history of Count Dracula.

DR. SCAVONE came to ISUE in 1970 from his position with Elmhurst College in Illinois where he taught history and classics. As a Professor of History, SCAVONE has taught all of the sequence courses in European History at ISUE.

He and his wife Vinetta have two children, Daniel Joseph, 12 and Cara Beth, 6. His family shares his enthusiasm for traveling and historical research and has accompanied him on some of his trips.

DR. SCAVONE'S contemporary interests include such favorites as bowling and tennis. He and his son also collect beer cans, and they are anxious to trade with other collectors.
