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AIDS EXPERT TO SPEAK. The Fall Semester Faculty and Administrative Staff Meeting will be held at 8:30 a.m. Monday, August 22, in Forum II, signaling the start of classes on the following Monday, August 29. **Dr. Margaret W. Bridwell**, director of the Health Center at the University of Maryland, will be the speaker at the fall meeting. A physician, Dr. Bridwell will deliver "Straight Talk About AIDS," discussing what faculty and staff members need to know to foster understanding and to help prevent the spread of AIDS. Following lunch in the UC Dining Room, there will be an orientation session in L 100 for new faculty members.

EMPLOYEE FEE WAIVER POLICY CHANGED. The USI Board of Trustees has approved a fee-waiver policy change for the University which basically offers a full-fee waiver for employees and half-fee waiver for their spouses and children. Each waiver applies to up to 124 attempted credit hours in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree; the policy limits the waiver for employees to six credit hours per academic year and three hours during summer sessions. Applications forms are available in the Financial Aid Office and Personnel Office, where validation of employee status is the first step in the waiver process. Contact either office for information.
