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## College of Business student volunteers offer free tax help

USI senior accounting students provide annual free tax assistance through the USI College of Business Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA),

In VITA programs, the Internal Revenue Service partners with national and local organizations to provide tax services to individuals with low-to-moderate income at no cost to the taxpayer. Accounting students will interview and prepare the taxes of other students and relatively low-income taxpayers who make an appointment for this service. This site will not prepare Schedule C business forms or Schedule E rental forms. Your federal and state tax returns are prepared while you wait and all taxpayers must be available to sign their returns. Preparation of returns typically takes up to two hours to complete.

This year, tax help will be available at 5 p.m. and 6:45 p.m. on Wednesdays starting February 6 by appointment only. The sessions will be held in Room 2039 in the Orr Center on the following Wednesdays: February 6, 13, 20, 27; March 5, 19, 26; and April 2 and 9.

No appointments will be available on Wednesday, March 12 during Spring Recess.

"This is a good opportunity for people who have reasonably simple income tax returns and want to avoid having to pay for professional tax preparation services," said **Brett Long**, associate professor of accounting and business law. "It is also a great experience for our accounting students."

Long said the students ordinarily prepare 100 to 150 tax returns each year.

Individuals are required to bring tax information, photo identification cards, Social Security cards for themselves and their dependents, and copies of 2006 tax returns if they are available. The IRS encourages electronic filing and returns will be filed electronically for those who are eligible. Paper returns will be prepared for those taxpayers who do not qualify for electronic filing.

## Atheneum receives 2008 American Institute of Architects Twenty-five Year Award

New Harmony's Atheneum, designed by **Richard Meier**, has received the 2008 American Institute of Architects (AIA) Twenty-five Year Award, intended to honor architectural design that has stood the test of time for 25 years. The building and architect will be honored at the American Architectural Foundation's Accent on Architecture gala in Washington D.C. in February.

The Atheneum serves as the Visitors Center for Historic New Harmony, a unified program of USI and the Indiana Division of State Museums and Historic Sites. It is the starting point for tours and a center for visitor orientation and cultural community events, and houses exhibits on the communal history of New Harmony, a

large theater, and the Museum Shop. The Atheneum's galleries also accommodate frequent receptions and meetings, allowing the structure to participate in the vitality of the community.

According to the AIA, the Atheneum "was conceived in terms of the linked ideas of architectural promenade and the historic journey of one of America's most significant utopian communities." The Atheneum has received numerous design awards including the Progressive Architecture Award for 1979 and an AIA Honor Award in 1982.

"The Atheneum is one of Richard Meier's seminal works of architecture," said nominator **Peter Eisenman**. "The design elements in this important work are evident throughout his career, having been further distilled to their most essential expression. While one of his earliest buildings, it is a wonderfully pure example of the recurring themes among his substantial oeuvre; it is a classic 'Meier' design."

**Mark Rozewski**, vice president for Business Affairs, said, "The Atheneum is known worldwide as a landmark work of modern architecture, and it is a great honor for the University to be the steward of this important building." Rozewski will attend the gala this month, along with **Connie Weinzapfel**, director of Historic New Harmony; **M. Edward Jones**, dean of Extended Services and associate vice president for Academic Affairs; and **Cindy Brinker**, vice president for Governmental Relations.

When the Atheneum opened in 1979, **Ada Louise Huxtable**, architecture critic for The New York Times, wrote, "On the banks of the Wabash River, not far from the corn fields of Indiana, stands a dramatically handsome new building representing architecture's most advanced frontier. This gleaming white structure is as radical an addition to the rural American heartland as Le Corbusier's Villa Savoye was to the French countryside at Poissy half-a-century ago."

Meier was the youngest architect to receive the Pritzker Architecture Prize, his profession's highest accolade. Shortly after receiving that honor, he was awarded the design of The Getty Center in Los Angeles. He also designed the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, Georgia; the Museum of Decorative Arts in Frankfurt, Germany; and an addition to the Des Moines Art Center in Iowa, among other commissions around the world.

## Pott Foundation Tri State Science and Engineering Fair registration deadlines approaching

Deadlines to register science and engineering fair projects for the 2008 Pott Foundation Tri State Science and Engineering Fair are February 7 for senior division projects and February 21 for junior division projects; the fair will be held March 10 through March 12 at USI. Registration can be done online at [www.usi.edu/science/fair](http://www.usi.edu/science/fair). Organizers of the fair encourage students to register soon to meet the deadline

The junior division is for students in grades six to eight; the senior division is for students in grades nine to 12. Students from area middle schools and high schools within a 75-mile radius of Evansville are eligible to participate in the fair.

**Dr. Scott Gordon**, dean of the Pott College of Science and Engineering at USI, said, "The Pott Foundation Tri State Science and Engineering Fair is the largest celebration of science in the Tri-

State and offers an exciting opportunity for students to display their research projects and receive recognition for their work."

This year marks the 59th year for the science and engineering fair in Evansville. This is the second year it will be held at the University of Southern Indiana.

The event will serve as the qualifier for the state and International Science and Engineering Fair (this year in Atlanta, Georgia). Awards will include six \$1,500 renewable USI scholarships in the senior division, cash awards, and plaques for winners. In addition, cash awards will go to classrooms with the most participants at the junior and senior divisions and to the classrooms of the winners, plus other awards.

There are 12 categories plus a team projects category. The categories are behavior and social sciences; botany; chemistry and biochemistry; computer science; earth and space sciences; engineering; environmental science; mathematics; medicine, health, and gerontology; and microbiology, physics, and zoology.

The site also offers ideas on how to come up with an idea for a project, key aspects of a successful project, how to prepare a scientific paper, what science fair judges want to see, and more.

Projects will be set up beginning at noon on Monday, March 10, with judging to take place from 6 to 7:30 p.m. that day. A free public exhibition of the projects will be open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, March 11. An awards ceremony and reception will be at 6:30 p.m. March 12 in Mitchell Auditorium in the Health Professions Center at USI.

The co-directors of the fair are **Dr. Shelly Blunt**, associate dean of the Pott College of Science and Engineering and associate professor of chemistry, and **Dave Ellert**, instructor in engineering.

## You can help the University comply with the Clean Water Act

The University of Southern Indiana is situated on approximately 300 acres of beautiful rolling hills in southwestern Indiana just a few miles north of the Ohio River. The campus has grown, over the last 39 years, from a few buildings to over 75 buildings. Careful planning has enabled this growth to take place while maintaining large forested areas, open green spaces and the construction of two large lakes. Storm water from buildings, paved parking areas and undeveloped areas is collected in a storm sewer conveyance system which is directed to the original natural drainage system. The natural drainage of storm water is divided into three watersheds as it leaves the campus. Each watershed flows through unnamed tributaries to Bayou Creek.

Congress enacted the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments in 1972. The Act was amended in 1977 and this law became commonly known as the Clean Water Act. In 1990 the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) established Phase I which covered medium and large Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4s). The Storm Water Phase II Final Rule was the next step under the Clean Water Act which covers MS4s in urbanized areas, universities, and prisons.

USI is included in Phase II MS4s and has implemented a program to assure compliance with regulations promulgated by the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM). The information presented here is intended to help the students, faculty, and staff of USI to understand the MS4 Program and the importance of reducing the pollution entering our storm water conveyance sys-

tem.

At USI, the storm water conveyance system consists of road ditches, curb inlets, storm drains, the two campus lakes, one pond and several intermittent streams that drain into Bayou Creek which then empties into the Ohio River.

Storm water runoff flows across planted areas and pavement into ditches, storm drains, or curb inlets. This runoff picks up animal waste, debris, chemicals, dirt, oil drippings from vehicles, and other pollutants which are carried into the conveyance system and eventually to the Ohio River.

Treating storm water runoff would be difficult and very expensive. Stopping pollutants from entering the system in the first place will be more effective, but it requires that all users of the USI campus join the effort. Here are some of the most important ways to prevent storm water pollution.

Properly dispose of hazardous materials such as used oil, paint, and other chemicals. DO NOT POUR them on the ground or into any part of the storm water conveyance system. Report misconduct to the offices named below.

Place trash in proper containers and prevent it from entering the conveyance system and plugging drains.

Use fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, and road chemicals properly to prevent excessive runoff.

Look for and report any signs of pollution such as discolored soil, debris and chemical residue. Also report any discharge from storm water outfalls during dry weather which could be a sign that there is a problem with the conveyance system.

Store all chemicals and other materials that can pollute storm water indoors. Any storage container that is used outdoors should not rust or leak.

Report any illegal dumping of trash, chemicals, or other waste immediately.

Report mud, debris, or other material in runoff from construction sites. Also report mud or any material being tracked onto roadways by construction vehicles.

Make reports of any observed pollution problem to one of the following: Physical Plant, 812/ 464-1729; Security, 812/464-1845; MS4 coordinator **Fred Kalvelage**, 812/464-5266.

There are other ways for you to get involved to reduce pollution in storm water runoff and assist in the MS4 program:

Volunteer to assist in marking existing storm drains which will help prevent dumping into those drains.

Participate in recycling programs for metal cans, plastic products, and paper products.

Recycle used oil through existing drop-off centers.

Properly dispose of hazardous materials such as paint and household chemicals during publicized collection days in each area county.

Properly maintain vehicles to reduce oil and gasoline dripping.
