MENTAL HEALTH DRIVE SUCCESSFUL. Elaine Thompson, Executive Director of the Mental Health Association in Vanderburgh County, wrote, "Thanks so much for all you did in the Christmas gift drive for the mentally ill. We certainly appreciate your willingness to help those who cannot help themselves. The community response was much better this year than in previous years. Your contributions made a great impact on helping us reach our gift goal."

ISUE was one of the biggest contributors to the Adult Mental Health annual Christmas drive this year. Last year the entire community gave only 300 gifts; this year the goal of 2500 was reached and bettered. ISUE organizations that participated in the drive were: Secretaries Club, University Jaycees, the Physical Plant, and a variety of anonymous individuals. The Secretaries Club chose to donate about 150 gifts rather than exchange Christmas gifts among themselves. The University Jaycees contributed individual gifts and their time, money and personalities for several public service announcements for the Mental Health drive. These were seen on Channel 7.



VOLUNTEER FAIR TO BE HELD ON CAMPUS. The ISUE-VAC (Volunteer Action Center, Inc.) Volunteer Fair will be held at ISUE on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 21 and 22, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. each day. The event will take place in the University Center student lounge.

Human Service agencies will be actively recruiting student volunteers for community service work within their agencies. Volunteers are recruited as teacher aides, readers to the blind, tutors for retarded and emotionally disturbed children, visitors to nursing home residents, transportation providers for the poor, etc.

Last year 22 human service agencies participated. 81 volunteers and one university student organization were recruited for voluntary service.
