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Hoops to be honored by alma mater

President H. Ray Hoops will be honored with a Distinguished Alumnus Award by the Eastern Illinois University Alumni Association during Eastern's homecoming in October.

Hoops, who has served as USI's president since 1994, earned an undergraduate degree from Eastern in 1962. He also holds master's and doctoral degrees in audiology and speech sciences from Purdue University and an MBA from Moorhead State University.

Before becoming the University's second president, Hoops served as vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at University of Mississippi and received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in an innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

The Illinois native's career as an educator and scientist includes a joint faculty appointment at University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar for the College of Medicine for University of the Philippines.

His numerous publications include the report of a study that received the national research award of the American Speech and Hearing Association, that professional association's highest honor. He also was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical cancer of the larynx patients and in the analysis of the language dynamics resulting from brain damage.

Hoops' administrative appointments include the Directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, for which he received two national service awards; dean of the Graduate College of University of Northern Iowa; associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education; vice president for Academic Affairs of North Dakota State University; and president of South Dakota State University.

The award will be presented at Eastern's Alumni Association Awards Dinner October 12.

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Series to examine Bellamy's utopia

The Center for Communal Studies Lecture Series will present "Edward Bellamy's Utopia: Pleasure Reconciled with Duty" at 7 p.m. October 10 in Carter Hall.

Bellamy's great-grandson, Dr. Michael Bellamy, professor of English at University of St. Thomas, will deliver the lecture that is free and open to the public.

Edward Bellamy (1850-1898) is best known as the author of the utopian novel *Looking Backward: 2000-1887*. His great-

grandson, who began his career in education as an instructor in the Peace Corps, has delivered numerous conference papers about his forebear, including "Edward Bellamy's Psychological Utopias," "Edward Bellamy's Family of Origin," "Edward Bellamy's Festive Comedies," and "Edward Bellamy's Martial Mania."

Before joining University of St. Thomas in 1979, the younger Bellamy was an instructor at University of New Orleans and a teaching assistant at University of Wisconsin, Madison. His work with the Peace Corps took place at Guru Gobind Singh College in India.

He holds a PhD in modern British and American literature from University of Wisconsin, Madison, and completed a post-graduate National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar in pastoral literature at University of Oregon. He also holds an MA from University of Michigan and a BA from John Carroll University.

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Early education advocate to speak at USI

An advocate for improvements in early childhood education will be the keynote speaker at the 12th annual Early Childhood Education Conference Saturday, September 28, at USI.

Dr. Diane Trister Dodge, founder and president of Teaching Strategies Inc., will present "What Brain Research Tells Us About Appropriate Curriculum for All Children" at 9 a.m. in the Health Professions Center. Her company seeks to improve the quality of early childhood programs by designing practical, easy-to-use curriculum and training materials and by providing staff development.

Trister Dodge has been a preschool and kindergarten teacher, served as the education coordinator for Head Start and childcare programs in Mississippi and Washington, D.C., and directed national projects in education and human services. She is the author of *The Creative Curriculum, Building the Primary Classroom, What Every Parent Needs to Know about 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Grades, Preschool for Parents*, and several other curriculum and competency-based training materials.

The conference will open with early bird workshops from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. Registration will begin at 6:30 a.m. Trister Dodge also will lead an afternoon workshop, "Applying a Developmentally Appropriate Curriculum Framework to Promoting Literacy in Preschool Classrooms."

The event is sponsored by Evansville Regional Association for the Education of Young Children, USI Department of Teacher Education, Vanderburgh County Step Ahead Council, and the Community Action Program of Evansville. Dr. Jane Meyer, associate professor of education, is one of the conference chairs.

Art exhibit focusing on form

New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will present "From the Forms," Martha Del Castillo, Jorge Riquelme Lavalle, and Miguel Peraza, Saturday, September 28, through Saturday, November 2.

A free reception for the artists will be held from 5 to 8 p.m. opening day at the gallery, located at 506 Main Street in New Harmony. The artists will discuss their works during the reception, and the public is invited to attend.

The exhibition, curated by Michael Aakhus, professor of art, features the work of two painters and a sculptor who share an interest in form.

Del Castillo's bold paintings blend indigenous and contemporary themes. Her work is primarily figurative and expressionistic. It has been shown in Mexico City, France, and the United States, and she has taught art courses at Universidad Anahuac.

"From the Forms" is bringing Riquelme Lavalle's work to the U.S. for the first time. An artist who has studied with many famous Mexican instructors since 1977, his paintings depict the underprivileged. He has exhibited in numerous group shows throughout Mexico.

Peraza, an accomplished sculptor, professor, and author, creates simple forms with clean lines that often represent nonfunctional machines. He is the academic director at two campuses of the Tecnológico de Monterrey in Mexico City and Estado de Mexico, and he teaches at the Universidad Iberamericana. Peraza has exhibited in numerous solo and group shows in Mexico, Colombia, Chili, France, Holland, and the U.S.

He co-wrote *Arte del Mercado en Arte*, edited two books, and wrote *Destino Cosmico*, a book on the life and work of his father master sculptor Marcos Andres Peraza.

The exhibition was made possible through the generous support of USI and the Indiana Arts Commission. Gallery hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and by appointment Sunday.
