"GLASNOST" COMES TO USI, NEW HARMONY. Dr. Peter Gladkov, Research Fellow of the Academy of Sciences in Moscow, will visit the USI Center for Communal Studies and speak in New Harmony on Tuesday, May 31. The public is invited to Dr. Gladkov's address, which will follow a 6:30 p.m. carry-in dinner of the Harmonie Associates at the Catholic Community Center. The event is free; for more information, contact Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, USI professor of history and director of the USI Center for Communal Studies, extension 1719.

USI BOARD RAISES STUDENT FEES. A \$2.75 increase in undergraduate student fees was approved by the USI Board of Trustees Friday, May 13, in line with the preliminary budget review recommendation to the Board that fees be raised 5.5 percent. Board action will increase undergraduate tuition for Indiana residents to \$50.75 per credit hour for the 1988-89 academic year. Other student fees also were raised around 5 percent, putting 1988-89 nonresident undergraduate tuition at \$124 per credit hour, resident graduate tuition at \$74, and nonresident graduate tuition at \$148. Other fee increases approved by the Board included men's basketball -- chairback seats, \$65 for a season ticket (up \$5) and \$6 for a single admission (up \$1), and child care -- \$9.50 a day for one child, \$13.50 for two (each up 50 cents), and \$16 a day for more than two (up \$1); the admission fee for baseball was eliminated. The Board also:

* Approved the \$15.9-million University budget proposed for 1988-89. More than a fourth of the \$2-million (14 percent) increase is needed for new programs -- the School of Nursing and Health Professions, projected at around \$425,000, and the Master of Business Administration program, projected at \$185,000.

* Approved an interim financing proposal to allow a construction start in the \$7.8-million classroom building project prior to the sale of bonds. A board-appointed committee will receive bids at 2 p.m. Thursday, May 19, then award contracts; construction could begin by early June.

* Approved a recommendation, based on declining enrollments, to discontinue the dental laboratory technology program at the end of the 1988-89 academic year and suspend classes, effective April 1, 1988, in the mining engineering technology program. Factors considered in the Academic Planning Council review leading to the recommendation to suspend or discontinue included enrollment patterns, accreditation standards, future growth potential, student interest, availability of similar programs in Indiana and the Midwest, and the institutional mission.

* Authorized USI President David L. Rice to seek state approvals for the transfer of \$25,000 appropriated by the 1983 General Assembly so that a campus entrance study may be carried out.

Mr. John McNaughton, professor of art -- Sculptural Exploration of the Art Deco Design Style of 1930s As It Could Be Applied To Present-Day Design Aesthetics.

Dr. Donald Pitzer, professor of history -- America's Communal Utopias: The Developmental Process.

Dr. Marlene Shaw, associate professor of biology -- Molecular Genetics Project: Cloning a Replication Origin.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. The following promotions were approved Friday, May 13, by the USI Board of Trustees -- **Dr. Yen-Tzu Fu** from associate professor to professor of mathematics and **Dr. Howard Gabannesch** from assistant professor to associate professor of sociology. The Board also approved the early retirement of **Mr. Charles M. Lonnberg**, catalog librarian and professor of library science, effective December 31. Mr. Lonnberg will have completed 19 years with the University.

Leaves of absence granted by the University include: leave with pay for 1988-89 academic year -- **Mr. John M. Barnes**, assistant professor of geology and geography; **Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich**, chairman of the Division of Engineering Technology; **Dr. Thomas M. Rivers**, professor of English; without pay, academic year -- **Mr. Abbas Foroughi**, assistant professor of business; with pay, fall 1988 -- **Mr. Paul E. Bennett**, associate professor of electrical engineering technology; without pay, fall 1988 -- **Mr. Richard T. Brengle**, assistant professor of English; with pay, spring 1989 -- **Dr. Gabannesch**; **Dr. David W. Kinsey**, associate professor of mathematics; **Dr. Donald E. Pitzer**, professor of history; and **Mr. Eric L. vonFuhmann**, assistant professor of English.

Dr. Munir Quddus, assistant professor of economics, will visit the Economic Institute at the University of Colorado-Boulder, to teach a graduate course in economics during the first summer session, June 9-July 12.

NEW COACHES NAMED. **Dr. Lionel L. Sinn**, a Bloomington, Indiana, native with 15 years of college-level coaching experience that include the last nine years at Northwest Missouri State University, has been named head coach of the men's basketball team. Dr. Sinn stresses the importance of education in athletics. Nearly 90 percent of his seniors have earned degrees. In addition to coaching, he will teach six hours of physical education. Dr. Sinn received his master's degree in physical education and administration with honors in 1965 and his doctorate in physical education in 1973, both from Indiana University. He was a graduate assistant to **Coach Bobby Knight** at IU and has a winning percentage in coaching (.633) that ranks second among the elite group of Knight assistants. Dr. Sinn is married and has three children. He is an Eagle Scout and has been a sponsor of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes for the past 15 years. His interests also include golf, fishing, and travel.

Mr. Tony Colavecchia, assistant soccer coach at the University of Evansville since 1986, has been named men's soccer coach at USI. A native of Skegness, England, he was athletic director and assistant dean of students at UE's Harlaxton College in England prior to moving to the Evansville campus. Mr. Colavecchia has been involved with various soccer programs from community to national levels. He holds a physical education degree from St. Paul's College in Cheltenham, England, and is working on his master's degree. He also will teach six hours of physical education. He and his wife, **Melanie**, have a daughter, **Chantel**.

Mr. Vic Coleman, who was associated with Dr. Sinn at Northwest Missouri and is known for his recruiting ability, has been named assistant men's basketball coach. He played at Northwest Missouri for four years, was the graduate assistant for one year, and the number one assistant for a year. He played one year with the Continental Basketball Association's Kansas City Sizzlers. A native of Danville, Virginia, Mr. Coleman is completing work on his master's degree and will teach six hours of physical education.

USI STUDENTS HONORED. **Ms. Jacqueline Heathcott**, **Ms. Lisa Ann Lytwynczuk**, and **Ms. Susan VanVector**, USI elementary education majors, were recognized for outstanding work as future educators by the Indiana Association of Colleges for Teacher Education at the group's second annual recognition banquet May 6 in Carmel, Indiana. **Dr. Robert E. Mays**, director of USI student teaching who accompanied the students, said the banquet recognizes outstanding teacher education students and serves as a starting point from which to launch their careers. IACTE is a volunteer organization of deans and directors of teacher training institutions and is affiliated with the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. Its purpose is to promote the highest quality of teacher education.

SOVIET BOYS CHOIR TO PERFORM. The Estonian State Boys Choir, considered the most prestigious choir in this Soviet republic, will present a concert at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 7, in Murphy Auditorium at New Harmony. All seats are reserved for this single performance; the \$7 tickets may be ordered through Red Geranium Enterprises, (812) 682-4431; May 31 is the deadline. The performance of the choir, a group of boys and young men organized as a classical mixed-voice choir, promises to be as exciting as the Soviet Perm Ballet Troupe's special dance presentation in early 1987. The program has been arranged by Friendship Ambassadors in response to the cultural exchange agreement between **President Reagan** and **Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev**.
