**CURRICULAR COMMITTEE.** The Curricular Committee gave first reading approval January 20 to a petition for the following new course:

- MATH 215 A Survey of Calculus ..... 3 hours

**Description:** An introduction to calculus and its applications in business, economics, and the social sciences. Not applicable to the mathematics major or minor. Prerequisite: 111 or 115 or consent of instructor.

**Rationale:** This course is being proposed specifically to assist the Division of Business in strengthening the mathematical preparation of its students. Topics included in this course have been requested by the division. In addition, the course may be of value to students interested in economics, biology, ecology, psychology, or sociology.

This course is to be offered initially in the fall semester, 1988. It can be used to meet general education requirements.

The program -- running from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday, and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday -- will feature a presentation by **Dr. Loretta Jones** of the University of Illinois who will discuss a chemical education package for computer info-windows. **DRAMA FESTIVAL.** The USI Division of Humanities is organizing a two-day trip to Louisville March 19-20 to attend plays that are being featured in the 12th Annual Humana Festival of New American Plays sponsored by Actors Theater of Louisville. The festival has premiered such Pulitzer Prize-winning works in the past as "Agnes of God," "The Gin Game," and "Crimes of the Heart." The USI group will see four of the seven 1988 productions, including "The Queen of the Leaky Roof Circuit" by **Mr. James Breslin**, a Pulitzer winning columnist; "Whereabouts Unknown" by **Ms. Barbara Damashek**; "Lloyd's Prayer" by **Mr. Kevin Kling**; and "Alone at the Beach" by **Mr. Richard Dressler**. **NEW HARMONY GALLERY.** The works of **Ms. Barbara Kendrick** and **Ms. Karen Spears** will be featured in February at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, beginning with a free public reception for the artists from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, February 7. The exhibition will continue through February 29. Ms. Kendrick teaches at the University of Illinois. Her large-scale figurative sculpture, made of painted sticks, straw, and other found materials, "form a connection between the environment and the self." The torsos hang on the wall and range from life-size to more than eight feet in height. Ms. Spears teaches painting at Eastern Kentucky University. Her paintings and mixed-media drawings are "a personal combination of events of reality and the subconscious," influenced by travels to Italy and the mystical quality of religious and narrative art which she combines with contemporary images. It has been exhibited at the Evansville Museum, among other showings.

Reid**, USI vice president for Academic Affairs, and the "Origins of Mankind" lecture at 7 p.m. Saturday, February 20, by famed anthropologist **Dr. Richard E. Leakey**, who is administrative director of the National Museums of Kenya, Africa. The fees for Dr. Reid's lecture on his new book, Back Home Again: Indiana in the Farm Security Administration Photographs, 1935-1943, are \$2 for Museum members, \$3 for non-members. Fees for Dr. Leakey's lecture are \$5 for Museum members, \$10 for non-members, with a special \$25 fee available for reserved seating and a reception following the lecture. Both lectures are scheduled at the Museum, but Dr. Leakey's program will be moved to North High School auditorium if reservations top 400.

IBM's traveling exhibition of models built according to **Mr. Leonardo da Vinci's** 15th century scientific and technical drawings is being shown through February 28 at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science. Mr. da Vinci investigated virtually every field of science. His observations and reactions, recorded in thousands of sketches and notes, contain practical solutions to problems of his day and envision such future possibilities as flying machines, automobiles, and automation. The IBM exhibit has visited museums, colleges, universities, and public libraries throughout the United States since 1951.

**Dr. C. Peebles**, director of the Black Laboratory of Archaeology at Indiana University, will speak on "Angel and Environ" at the 7:30 p.m. meeting Tuesday, February 2, of Friends of Angel Mounds at Angel Mounds State Historic Site.

**Mr. George Painter**, historian at the Lincoln Home National Historic Site in Springfield, Illinois, will be the featured speaker at 2 p.m. Sunday, February 7, at the annual Lincoln Day Program at Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial to honor the memory of **President Abraham Lincoln** and his parents. The program will include Mr. Painter's "Lincoln and the Constitution" address, music by St. Meinrad Seminary Chorus, a memorial ceremony, and the traditional pilgrimage to lay a wreath on the grave of **Mrs. Nancy Hanks Lincoln**.
