"Scots in Harmony" celebration planned

From bagpipes to tossing the caber, "Scots in Harmony" will offer the public a chance to enjoy the region's Scottish heritage when the Historic New Harmony Society presents a family festival from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, October 13, at the Mumford Farm at Griffin, Indiana.

Traditional music, dancing, and entertainment will continue throughout the day in the Pub Tent, featuring Mr. Colin Grant-Adams, balladeer from Oban, Scotland; Mr. Donnie Macdonald, troubadour from the Outer Hebrides of Scotland; the Kyilindy Bagpipe Band; and the Highland Dancers, demonstrating traditional steps like the Highland Fling and the Sword Dance.

Guests can "raise a pint" at the Pub Tent or enjoy such Scottish fare as rumbledegumps, bangers, Scotch eggs, or shortbread. There also will be three seatings during the day of an elegant "proper Scottish tea."

The Saint Andrew's Society will help guests explore their Scottish roots with a genealogy and family clan display. Athletes from around the country will compete in the Highland Games, with events to include the caber toss, sheaf toss, and hammer throw. World-champion border collies will demonstrate their amazing sheep-herding skills throughout the day.

Evansville native to be distinguished lecturer

The University of Southern Indiana's first annual Distinguished Lecture in Natural Science will be presented Thursday, October 17, by Dr. David B. Wilson, an Evansville native and Bosse High School graduate who now is professor of history, mechanical engineering, and philosophy at Iowa State University.

His topic, "Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Rethinking the History of Science and Religion," is based on his early 1980s work leading to a paper, "Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Historical Perspectives on the Creation-Evolution Controversy," which was published in the Proceedings of the Iowa Academy of Science in 1982. Iowa State University Press then published his book, *Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Modern Perspectives on the Creation-Evolution Controversy*, which was selected by CHOICE in 1984 as the Outstanding Academic Book of 1983. The book went to a fourth printing this year.

The free public lecture will be held at 7 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium; a reception will follow. Dr. Wilson's book, which was written for general audiences, will be available for sale and autographing.

The Distinguish Lecture in Natural Science program, made possible by the generous support of private donors, is expected to feature renowned speakers annually to heighten awareness and foster appreciation of the sciences at the University and in the Evansville community and greater Tri-State.

Dr. Wilson received a B.A. in physics from Wabash College and Ph.D. in the history of science from Johns Hopkins University, where he was a teaching assistant. He joined the Iowa State faculty in 1975 after having taught four years at the University of Oklahoma and served as archivist for the Stokes and Kelvin Papers in the Cambridge University Library for four years.

Dr. Wilson is a noted scholar whose expertise is the history and philosophy of science. He has the distinction of holding academic rank in three departments at Iowa State, however. Dr. Wilson is the author of numerous books, chapters, and research articles, is an active member of numerous professional organizations, and has spent time in research and teaching in Scotland. He will be a Visiting Research Fellow this academic year in the Institute for Advanced Studies in the Humanities at the University of Edinburgh. He has done research at the University of Glasgow and was a visiting professor this year in the Department of Physics and Applied Physics at the University of Strathclyde.

Most grants provide round-trip transportation, tuition, and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only, or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid. In this 50th anniversary year of the Fulbright exchange, there are some 800 student awards available in ALL fields to more than 100 countries. Kellogg grants:

The W.K.Kellogg Foundation has announced a new Kellogg National Leadership Program (KNLP) for Group XVI, designed to prepare leaders who can function effectively and knowledgeably in dealing with complex problems where narrow expertise is not sufficient.
