## CONSERVATION OUTDOOR EDUCATION COMMITTEE TO MEET ON CAMPUS

The Conservation Outdoor Education Association is planning a meeting on campus on Saturday, April 27 in L-107. *J. Maxwell Davis*, Associate Professor of Life Science and Region IV Chairman of the Conservation Association, explains that the Association is made up of supervisors and teachers from high schools and universities throughout Indiana. The objective of the Association is to make people more conscious of environmental affairs and to train them in workshops so they may function better in their own schools. Region IV consists of 15 counties.

The morning program will be conducted by *J. Maxwell Davis*, and first speaker of the day will be *Michael Price* of Environmental Education Service Center. Mr. Price developed a work manual for use by teachers in the field.

The afternoon program will be held at Wesselman's Park Nature Center. *Larry Sheffield*, Director of Wesselman's Park Nature Center, will present a program on training volunteers for field work. *LeMoine Torgerson*, Director of Parks in Evansville, will talk on "Educational Plans through Park Department." *James Schwengel*, Harrison Science Dept. Chairman and ISUE Adjunct Instructor in Life Science, will present a study on what the high schools are doing to correlate their nature studies there with the ISUE Bent Twig area. The afternoon program will be rounded out with *Robert Voegeli*, Harrison Biology Teacher, presenting the tools and mechanics of teaching ecology in a natural area.

## FOREIGN STUDENT INTERVIEW

*Mathee Pongvacharak*, part-time student at ISUE, is from Takhli, Nakhon Sawan (the Heaven City) in Thailand. *Mathee* is a junior at Brescia College in Owensboro majoring in Business Administration, and takes one course at ISUE.

Before coming to Evansville, *Mathee* spent a few months in California, Florida and New York. He loved the California weather and mentioned the fact that there are 20,000 Thais in San Francisco now, living, working and studying. After graduating, *Mathee* plans to obtain a master's degree before returning to Thailand to hopefully set up a business of his own. In addition to his parents, he has five sisters and a brother living in Thailand, and although anxious to return, admits that he plans to take his time and stop off at several places on the way home for extended visits and sightseeing.

*Mathee* likes much of our food but thinks we don't eat enough vegetables. "You can always find something you like to eat," he maintained, "but it's very expensive." He laughingly remarked that it's like the old Thai saying, "You can have an American house, a Japanese wife and Chinese food--if you can afford it." In other words, this is the Thai idea of perfection.

Although *Mathee* says he doesn't date too much because too much dating will cause his studies to go downhill, he does have an active social life. He loves parties, dancing, and singing with a guitar he taught himself to play over a period of two years and the help of six guitar books. He enjoys soccer and gymnastics and belongs to a one-night-a-week Bible study group. In addition to commuting between two colleges and his extra-curricular activities, *Mathee* works 20 hours a week at Deaconess Hospital.

*Mathee* not only studied English for several years in Thailand, but also speaks, reads and writes Mandarin. He is very determined to get a good education while he's in the United States and says he doesn't try for grades alone. He studies each subject separately and then as a whole until he can see his educational program as a whole complete picture.
