UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA
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SANKT NIKOLAUS FEST SLATED DECEMBER 1. The USI German department will sponsor its second annual Sankt Nikolaus Fest from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Monday, December 1, in the University Center dining room to celebrate the traditional Christmas festivities of Germany and encourage Evansville area residents to better appreciate their German heritage. In the German observance, a stately bishop named Nikolaus arrives at homes on December 6 with his golden book of children's names, good deeds, and desired improvements. In the USI observance, families may begin a "Tannenbaum" tradition by bringing a homemade tree ornament and signing an "ornament book" so that the tree will "grow" with additions by new fest participants each year. Admission is the tree ornament and a plate of cookies. Hot, spiced cider and coffee will be sold by American Food Management. Candy for the children is donated by area businesses. The evening's program will include decorating the tree, a short slide presentation on German Christmas customs, the singing of traditional German carols, the arrival of Sankt Nikolaus, and the refreshments. Reservations are requested due to space limitations.

Parents who want smaller children (infants through first grade) to receive a gift of sweets should call the Division of Humanities, extension 1735, between 8 a.m. and 12 noon and 1 and 4 p.m. weekdays. In addition, parents should provide the name of the child and mention one especially helpful thing the child did during the year and one area which could use a little improvement. Sankt Nikolaus will read these personal items aloud from his "golden book" of children to fulfill the tradition that, with his bag of goodies and an occasional admonishment, is a vivid reminder of the joy and spirit of Christmas.

The celebration was conceived by **Drs. Donald and Susan Wolfe**, instructors in German at USI, and is as close as possible to the authentic German Christmas party. The bishop's costume will be worn by a native German. The miter was built by **Mr. Michael Aakhus**, USI assistant professor of art. The Wolfes also will make available a register of Osnabrueck residents so festival partiers can send Christmas cards to their "sister city" folks in West Germany.

NINTH SPEECH MEET SATURDAY. The USI communications department will hold its ninth annual High School Speech Meet Saturday, November 22, with some 200 students from Tri-State high schools expected to participate. They will compete in categories of Broadcasting; Congress; Domestic and Foreign Extemporaneous; Dramatic, Humorous, and Oratorical Interpretation; Dramatic Duo; Original Oratory; and Poetry. Trophies will be awarded to the schools with the highest number of sweepstakes points and dual

ribbons will be awarded student winners in each category. Coaches from the high schools and USI communications students will serve as judges. **Mr. Seymour Brodsky**, USI assistant professor of communications, will be in charge of the Broadcasting event. **Dr. Helen A. Sands**, professor of communications, and **Ms. Mary A. Schroeder**, assistant professor of communications, are co-chairpersons for the meet.

COMMUNITY OF SCHOLARS TO FEATURE IU DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR. Dr. Harold G. Shane, who holds a distinguished professorship at Indiana University with the title of university professor of education, will be featured in a USI Community of Scholars program on Thursday, November 20. He will deliver a public lecture, "Some Social and Educational Consequences of the Microelectronic Age," at 7:30 p.m. in Forum I. The program is sponsored by the Division of Education and arranged by **Dr. Charles Bertram**, chairman of the division and professor of education and mathematics. Dr. Shane formerly was dean of the IU School of Education and has done extensive research and writing on education in the future.

LABOR-MANAGEMENT SEMINAR. A day-long seminar on "Creative Strategies for Area Labor and Management Organizations" will be held Thursday, November 20, at USI, co-sponsored by the University, the Indiana Labor-Management Council, Inc., and the Evansville Area Labor-Management Forum. The seminar is designed to provide practical ideas and strategies from individuals who have been involved in some of the nation's most effective area labor-management organizations. Among activities for the USI observance will be the administration of lung capacity tests for all interested persons. **Mr. Robert Hooper**, director and instructor of respiratory therapy in the Division of Allied Health, will be in charge of the testing, with his equipment to be set up on the second floor of the University Center. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Charles T. Barber, professor of political science, participated in a workshop on "Bringing the Third World to the Classroom" on November 15 at Spelman College in Atlanta. Sponsored by the Consortium for International Cooperation in Higher Education, the workshop included 60 professors from 15 states.

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, professor of sociology, presented his paper, "The Superiority of Simulations over Lectures in Teaching Social Psychology," at the 25th annual Conference of North American Simulation and Gaming Association on November 7 at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He was reappointed as a game reviewer for the journal, *Simulation and Games*.

Dr. Victoria Pohl, professor of mathematics, is the author of an article, "Producing Curved Surfaces in the Octahedron: Enrichment for Junior High School Students," which appears in the November 1986 issue of the *Arithmetic Teacher*, an official journal of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs, attended the annual conference November 12-14 on Creative Management in Higher Education. He and **Dr. Wes Face**, vice chancellor at the University of Wisconsin-Stout, led a workshop on long-range planning. Dr. Reid also was a member of a panel which discussed "Institutional Integrity in a Changing Environment," which followed an opening address by **Senator William Proxmire**.

Dr. Susan Smith Wolfe, special part-time instructor in German, has been elected president of the Evansville-Osnabrueck Society for 1986-87 and **Dr. Christoph Kirchner**, assistant professor of business, was elected to the Executive Board. The society is dedicated to active cultural, educational, and trade exchanges between Evansville and its partner city, Osnabrueck, West Germany. The past two years have brought reciprocal town hall visits, exchanges of both public and private high school students, as well as the initial steps in university student and faculty exchanges. **Mr. Michael Gilles**, a USI junior in business and German, is studying this year at the University of Osnabrueck. **Dr. Harald Husemann**, professor of English at Osnabrueck, will spend two months of the 1987 spring semester at USI and the University of Evansville. In early summer, the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science will exhibit a collection of works by Osnabrueck artists.
