### ISUE AND THE ENERGY CRISIS

Indiana State University Evansville will take the following steps to conserve energy resources during the energy crisis:

### Fuel

The temperature settings in all buildings where possible will be reduced to 68 degrees from the present 72 degrees. This reduction will be made gradually over the next two-week period. Heating will be eliminated in the stairwells.

## Electricity

Air circulating fans will be shut off during hours of 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. and during the weekend periods, with the exception of the Library. If a group plans to use space during the week end, special arrangements need to be made. Outdoor lighting will be reduced to a minimum. Faculty members are asked to turn off the classroom lights after their class is completed only if no class is scheduled in the room during the next hour. Office lights should be turned off when the office is not being occupied for a period of 30 minutes or more. Staff members desiring less lighting in an office can contact Mr. Paul Grimes, Ext. 282 and a reduction in the number of lighted bulbs will be made. The amount of lighting in hallways will be reduced.

### Gasoline

Governor Bowen has issued orders that all state motor vehicles will observe a 50 mph speed limit. This order applies to ISUE vehicles. Travel will be restricted to only necessary trips and trips involving more than one traveler will receive priority in the scheduling of TSUE vehicles. All employees and students are urged to utilize car pools whenever possible.
