SEDER SUPPER PLANNED. The traditional Jewish Passover family meal, the Seder, will be performed at Indiana State University Evansville on April 4 beginning at 7:00 p.m. Mrs. Sadelle Berger, president of the Jewish Community Council, will lead the service.

Sponsored by the ISUE Campus Ministry, the Seder Supper is open to persons of all faiths. According to TERRI WEBER, student coordinator of the event, "this is an opportunity to join

in the Jewish ritual that is not always available outside the Jewish home. It is a family meal, so we are encouraging families to attend. It is a celebration in the Jewish custom relating the Exodus from Egypt and explaining the meaning of the rites and symbols connected with the celebration of the passover."

A colorful occasion, the Seder is not purely devotional. Its intensely spiritual tone is mingled with bursts of good humor. Its serious observations on Jewish life and destiny includes comments in a lighter vein, and the lofty poetry is accompanied by playful ditties for the entertainment of the children.

The symbolic food—wine, matzo, parsley, horseradish, haroses, roasted shank bone, egg, and aphikomon—will be served and explained by Mrs. Berger. Traditional readings and songs will be included in the Seder. A full meal of wine, chicken soup with matzo balls, fresh vegetables, relishes, gefilte fish and horseradish, roast chicken with matzo—giblet stuffing and fresh fruit will be served to the participants.

Reservations can be made by calling ISUE, 464-1863. The cost is \$3.75 for adults and children under 12 half price.

EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT. The latest fascinations in JON CARLSON'S life are "Pyramid Power" and entering sweepstakes. And believe-it-or-not DR. CARLSON, ISUE Director of Music, is using one to complement the other. He has his sweepstakes entries "energyzing" under a self-made pyramid.


An article in <u>Time</u> magazine a year or so ago drew DR. CARLSON'S attention to "Pyramid Power". More recently he found a paperback book which describes the basis for the pyramid power theory. Putting this theory into practice, DR. CARLSON and his wife Anita have built posterboard pyramids and contend that by setting various foods beneath the pyramid they have enhanced the flavor of coffee, ripened fresh fruit, and made tap water taste like spring water.

Many people believe in the uncanny power of the pyramid, DR. CARLSON says. Some feel a sense of warmth or tingling when they place their hand near its surface; others feel they increase their mental capabilities by sitting under a pyramid, and practice this exercise much the way Eastern philosophers use meditation.

According to DR. CARLSON, the pyramid was never used as a burial place for the Egyptian pharoahs but rather their bodies were placed in the king's room near the center of the pyramid to mummify and then taken elsewhere for burial. The pyramid causes rapid dehydration and substances mummify quickly.

Last September the CARLSON'S began entering sweepstakes contests regularly. In October one of those entries paid off in a \$500 cash award. DR. CARLSON says there is a systematic, common sense approach to be used by sweepstakes entrants. "You should spread your entries out; send out so many entries that your chances of winning are significantly increased; and send a few (entries) daily so they are scattered throughout the mailbags from which the drawings are made. DR. CARLSON believes before entering you should evaluate the prizes, making sure they are worth the effort.

DR. CARLSON pursues his professional life with the same intense enthusiasm. He received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Westminister Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey, and



his PhD in Music Arts at the University of Illinois. At ISUE he acts as Director of Music leading the Mid America Singers and the University Singers. In the community he directs the Evansville Philharmonic Chorus and is organist and choral director at First Presbyterian Church in downtown Evansville. On April 16 he will change roles and join the tenors as Minas Christian conducts the orchestra and chorus in the performance of "Samson and Delilah". When asked why he chose music as his career, DR. CARLSON replied: "I am in choral music because I like to work with people. I believe choral music is the highest form of music. It brings people togeth-The voice is the most intimate instrument . . . very close to the psychic." He agrees with the Catholic adage, "He who sings prays twice."

- EMPLOYFF PORTRAIT. DR. CARLSON and his wife Anita are the parents of two daughters, Heather and Jennifer, and reside near Mt. Vernon, Indiana.
- EXECUTIVE-IN-PESIDENCE, Dr. Leon Kendall will be the featured speaker at a noon luncheon on April 1 as part of the ISUE Division of Business Executive-in-Residence program. Local business persons are being invited to the luncheon. His topic for the luncheon will be "Money, Capital Markets, Interest."

Dr. Kendall's professional role in the financial world is noteworthy. He was the first full-time president of the Association of Stock Exchange firms and went on to become president of the Securities Industry Association when ASEF and the Investment Bankers Association merged.

Prior to his presidency of the associations, Lee Kendall was a vice president and economist of the New York Stock Exchange and for six years the economist for the U.S. League of Savings Associations and economist for the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta. In 1973, he was the recipient of the Academy of Alumni Fellows Award by the Indiana University School of Business, where he received an M.B.A. in marketing and a D.B.A. in economics in 1950 and 1956, respectively.

Among his many directorships, Lee Kendall has been a trustee of Indiana University School of Business, the Securities Regulation Institute of the University of California, Marquette University, and First Federal Savings of New York City. In addition, Lee Kendall was a commissioner of the State of New Jersey Mortgage Study Commission (1971-72). He is the author of several books on financial institutions, the New York Stock Exchange and the savings and loan business.

The Executive-in-Residence program is designed to bring on campus a business professional who can exchange ideas with the business students and faculty.
