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BIOLOGY-AT-THE-INTERFACE SERIES TO LOOK AT SPORTS AND DRUGS; HAPS SEMINAR SLATED

Dr. Brad Bomba, Jr., a Bloomington physician, will speak on "Sports and Drugs: Focus on Anabolic Steroids" at the next Biology-at-the-Interface program at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 26, in Forum I.

Dr. Bomba is an Indiana University graduate who completed an internal medicine residency at Methodist Hospital, Indianapolis. During that time, he was team physician for two high school football teams. He recently returned to Bloomington to enter private practice with his father, who is team physician for the IU basketball team.

The Biology-at-the Interface series explores the impacts and issues of biological sciences on related fields, individuals, and society. It is sponsored by the USI Biology Department and supported by the USI Foundation Fund for Science and Engineering Technology programs.

Currently, USI biology faculty are conducting an in-service project with 15 biology teachers in Evansville public and Catholic high schools which focuses on biological fundamentals that underlie various societal problems. Dr. Bomba's visit will be incorporated in that program.
