ROBOT EXHIBIT. "Robots and Space Toys," a 200-piece exhibit that includes 150 robots from the 1940s through the '80s, will open Thursday, June 30, at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science. The exhibit draws from the collections of Mr. John McNaughton, USI professor of art, and Mr. David Knepper, a former student of Mr. McNaughton's who is art director for The Evansville Courier. They will be at the Museum on Monday, July 11, to demonstrate the toys and discuss their collections. The exhibit will continue through August 21.

NEW HARMONY GALLERY. Two Jasper, Indiana, artists -- Ms. Deborah Hutchinson and Mr. Bernard Hagedorn, co-owners of Jasper-Sign-Arts, a sculpture fabrication company -- will be featured July 1-31 at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The reception for the artists will be held at the close of the show, from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, July 31. Both artists make floor and wall sculptures that take a humorous look at their immediate surroundings. Ms. Hutchinson combines silkscreened images with steel to create houses and backyard vegetable gardens with a high-tech, manufactured look. Mr. Hagedorn's work combines cast iron, steel, and wood to create playhouses with balls lodged in the roofs or going through the centers. His recent work features carved wood wall reliefs and free-standing sculptures in arrowhead shapes, with faces peering out of them.

Ms. Hutchinson has a BFA from Herron School of Art and MFA from the Maryland Institute in Baltimore, where she taught printmaking and photoprocessing. She now teaches at Vincennes University. Mr. Hagedorn received a BFA from Herron and MFA from Rutgers University, and studied at the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture. Formerly co-head of the fabrication department at Johnson Atelier in Trenton, New Jersey, he built sculptures for such international artists as Julian Schnabel and Brian Hunt. At Jasper-Sign-Arts in 1987, he fabricated six monumental sculptures for artists around the U.S., with a value of more than \$350,000. He was the 1987 recipient of an Indiana Arts Commission Fellowship and is working on the Bill Schroeder Memorial, "Gateway to the Heart," for the City of Jasper.
