## VICE-PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS APPOINTED BY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Robert Louis Reid, currently Dean of Social Science, Sangamon State University, was appointed by the Board of Trustees to the position of Vice-President for Academic Affairs for the Evansville Campus, effective January 1, 1975.

Vice-President Reid earned a B.A. in History from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, and an M.A. and Ph.D. in History from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. He was a Teaching Assistant and Lecturer at Northwestern University and earlier taught in Deerfield High School.

Dr. Reid was on the history department faculty and subsequently served as Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Science at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. While on leave from that position he served as Assistant Director for Programs for the Illinois Board of Higher Education. Since 1971 Dr. Reid has been Dean of Social Science at Sangamon State University at Springfield, Illinois.

Six candidates were selected for interview from the 240 or more applicants by the Campus Search Committee. The six candidates were interviewed and evaluated by members of the Campus Search Committee, members of the Academic Affairs staff, and Campus Administration. The credentials and evaluations were reviewed with President Rankin and selected candidates were then interviewed by President Rankin and the Vice-Presidents at the Terre Haute Campus. Three Board of Trustee members also participated in the final review selection processes, prior to recommending Dr. Reid for appointment by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Reid, his wife, Joanne, and their two children will move to the Evansville area in late December.
