## **USI, MUSEUM TO PRESENT "REMEMBERING WORLD WAR II"**

The Evansville Museum of Arts and Science and USI have created "Remembering World War II," an exhibition of Thomas Hart Benton paintings of LST (landing ship tank) construction combined with public discussions of life here while the nation was at war. The project is supported by a grant from the Indiana Humanities Council. The Benton exhibition will open Sunday, October 25, and continue through November 29. The first public discussion, "The Evansville Shipyard," will be held at 2 p.m. October 25 in the Contemporary Gallery at the museum.

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, USI professor of history and director of Historic Southern Indiana Project, will be the moderator. Panelists will be Dr. James Kellar, Indiana University professor emeritus of archaeology who is completing a history of the Evansville shipyard; Mr. Roman Ritzert, retired, former chief hull inspector for Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Company; and Mr. D. W. Vaughn, retired Southern Indiana Gas & Electric Company chairman who was an engineer at the shipyard.

The second discussion, "Down the Ohio into Combat," will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, November 1; the final discussion, "Benton as Artist and Recorder of History," will be at 2 p.m. Sunday, November 8. The "America at War" Gallery at the museum also will display a photographic exhibit of the shipyard.

The public is encouraged to view the paintings and photographs and join in the discussions.
