USI TO HOST 1985 WRITERS' CONFERENCE. Mr. Stephen Birmingham, who made publishing history by having two books on The New York Times bestseller list at the same time, will deliver the keynote address for the Ohio River Writers' Conference, which will be held Friday through Sunday, August 2-4, in the University Conference Center. Birmingham will speak at the conference banquet at 6 p.m. Friday and also lead workshops on non-fiction writing.

The public is being invited to the banquet and the public readings which will be led Friday at 8 p.m. by non-fiction author Ms. Andrea Darvi, and Saturday at 8 p.m. by poet Ms. Rita Dove and fiction writer Mr. Michael Martone. The three also will lead workshops in their fields. Other participants will include Mr. Peter Jacobi, professor of journalism at Indiana University, in a Public Relations Forum; Ms. Jane Jordan Browne, a Chicago literary agent with advice on product marketing; and state and local authors -- Mr. Gary Devon, Ms. Jo Frohbieter-Mueller, Ms. Maggie Greenwood-Robinson, Ms. Sandra Hermann, Ms. Rebecca Carson Kelley, Mrs. Marilyn Kluger, Ms. Ann Stuart, and Father Joseph Ziliak -- who will lead topic workshops.

Reservations for the Friday banquet, at \$10 per person, may be made by calling the Evansville Arts and Education Council (422-2111), which is co-sponsoring the conference with USI. There is no charge for the public readings. A complete schedule of the conference and registration fees for the various seminars may be obtained from Dr. Sherry Darrell, assistant professor of English at USI and chairperson for the conference.

MUSIC FESTIVAL SET AT NEW HARMONY. The New Harmony Festival of Music will open its eighth annual season August 1, with the nine-day schedule to feature a wide variety of music and dance attractions — eight evening and four noon programs highlighted by vocal and instrumental groups, soloists, a brass quintet, a coffee house concert, chorale group, children's choir, the Cincinnati Court Dancers, and "The Fantasticks" musical presentation by the New Harmony Theatre company.

The Back Bay Brass Quintet will open the festival at 8 p.m. Thursday, August 1, at Thrall's Opera House. A "Coffee House" concert celebrating the 300th anniversary of Bach and Handel will feature chamber works and Bach's "The Coffee Cantata" at 8 p.m. Friday, August 2, at the Shadblow Restaurant.

Among featured soloists will be Mr. James Barbagallo, a California-born pianist who was the 1982 Bronze medalist of the International Tchaikovsky Competition, and Mr. Warren Ellsworth, dramatic tenor from New England who has appeared with the San Francisco, Washington, and Canadian operas, Welsh National Opera, Boston Symphony, and Los Angeles Philharmonic. Barbagallo will be featured at 8 p.m. Tuesday, August 6, and Ellsworth will be featured at 8 p.m. Wednesday, August 7, both at Thrall's Opera House.

The New Harmony Theatre production of "Fantasticks" will open Thursday, July 25 at Murphy Auditorium, with performances slated at 8 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 2 p.m. on Sunday, through August 17. Tickets are available at Murphy Auditorium, while ticket information for the music festival may be obtained from New Harmony Festival of Music, Inc., P.O. Box 173, New Harmony, IN 47631, or by calling 682-3483 between 1 and 4 p.m.

BOOKSTORE OFFERING CHEAPER COMPUTER SUPPLIES. The USI Bookstore now will be stocking a line of lower-priced 5 1/4-inch diskettes and competitively priced printer ribbons. The diskettes were tested by the Computer Center and found to be equal or superior to the 3M diskettes regularly stocked. The new diskettes are from BROWN DISK Manufacturing Company, and will retail for \$3.95 for the DSDD, compared to \$4.95 for the 3M. Service contracts with the USI Computer Center will be valid for either BROWN DISK or 3M diskettes. The Bookstore will stock the 3M brand as long there is a demand. The Bookstore also is stocking ribbons for almost all printers used on campus, including Epson, IBM, NEC, and Okidata. Comparisons with price quotes through the Purchasing Office show the cost is equal or lower when buying ribbons at the Bookstore.
