AQUATICS ARTS FESTIVAL BACK AT USI. The 32nd annual International Aquatic Arts Festival for members of the International Academy of Aquatic Art will be held Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, May 15-16-17, at USI, sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education. More than 300 clubs in the U.S., Canada, and other countries have been invited to participate in the three days of workshops, clinics, and presentations. Public performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on Friday and 4 p.m. on Saturday. Admission is \$2. Seating will be limited and both public performances are expected to be sellouts.

Advance tickets may be obtained from **Mr. Paul Krack**, USI instructor of physical education and recreational sports coordinator, who is festival director. He is a member of the IAAA board and the USI Swimdancers and has performed in five international festivals, receiving two IAAA ratings, three AAA ratings, and two AA ratings. He and **Ms. Peg Dunn** will perform a duet, "Carmen," and also will participate in a group composition, "Audition."

USI ARTISTS HAVING BUSY YEAR. **Mr. John McNaughton**, professor of art, is not the only USI art instructor on an artistic treadmill this year. **Mr. Leonard Dowhie**, associate professor of art, has just returned from Mexico City and San Antonio, Texas, where he presided over the 20th annual conference of the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts. He was awarded a Fellowship to the council, becoming one of only 19 artists who have received this award in the council's 20 years of existence. He has participated in 24 exhibitions in Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, North Carolina, North Dakota, Michigan, Arkansas, and Missouri this past year, and has been a lecturer or resident in programs in North Carolina, Illinois, and Texas. Included was a residency at Lill St. Studios and Lill St. Gallery, where he designed a pilot project that involved a 2 1/2-month project in a semi-public setting, drawing, working with clay, lecturing, and teaching. The culmination will be a one-person exhibition in conjunction with the Chicago and Vicinity Exhibition to be held at Lill St. Gallery and the Chicago International Art Exposition in May.

Ms. Kathryn Waters, assistant professor of art, also has been busy, with one of her most notable efforts included in the gala opening last weekend of Indianapolis' newly remodeled Union Station. She is doing eight wall

murals for the Holiday Inn, inside the former train station, with four of them completed for the opening event. She hopes to finish the other four in June. The oil paintings depict windows of passing passenger coaches. Ms. Waters has used several of her friends and colleagues at USI as models for the people seen through train windows of the 1940s, an era she focuses on for much of her work. She also will exhibit a painting in the 1986 Mid-America Biennial at the Owensboro Museum of Fine Art from June 15 to August 6, and recently served as a judge for the 1986 High School Art Show at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science. The Evansville Museum also is sponsoring a series of "Evansville on Paper" drawing shows this summer and Ms. Waters and Mr. Michael Aakhus, USI assistant professor of art, will be representing USI in that series. He will be there June 15-July 10, and she will be there July 15-August 10.

USI TEACHER/STUDENT EXHIBITION AT NEW HARMONY. The work of Mr. McNaughton and Mr. Dowhie and two of their former students, Ms. Nancy Burch and Ms. Nelia Kimbrough, co-owners of the Parrett Street Gallery, will be presented in a May exhibition, "Peers Appear," at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The exhibition will open with a reception from 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday, May 4, and will continue through May 29.

Mr. McNaughton recently exhibited at Hokin-Kaufman Gallery, Chicago, and will show architectural wooden sculpture in New Harmony. Mr. Dowhie shows with Martha Snyder in Chicago, and will present his ceramic wall pieces and pastel drawings at New Harmony. Miss Burch will exhibit wooden and glass sculpture; non-functional ceramic sculpture will be shown by Ms. Kimbrough.

Both Mr. Dowhie and Mr. McNaughton will be represented in May at the Chicago International Art Exposition, which will be the featured attraction for a USI bus tour the weekend of May 10-12. Ms. Connie Weinzapfel, director of the New Harmony Gallery and former coordinator of the Chicago Art Expo, will be the tour guide.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. An article by Dr. Charles T. Barber, professor of political science, was published in Teaching to Potential: Proceedings 1986, pages 395-404. The article, "The Electoral College in 1988: A Model for Nationwide Campus Simulations," was included in the section, "Relating Disciplinary Research to University Teaching."

Dr. Robert Gehring, associate professor of psychology, presented a paper, "Recall of Enacted Events Covertly Labeled and Described Events Visually Imaged," at the meeting of the Eastern Psychological Association on April 19 in New York City. The data showed that a teaching strategy utilizing videotaped demonstrations can produce better learning and long-term retention than a verbal lecture supplemented by the most efficient learner strategy of visual imagination.

New World Architecture, the first full-length collection of poetry by **Mr. Matthew Graham**, USI assistant professor of English, has gone to a second printing by Galileo Press of Sparks, Maryland. It has received favorable reviews in *The New York Times Book Review*, *Publishers Weekly*, *Library Journal*, *Chicago Literary Review*, *Choice*, and elsewhere.

Dr. Donald Wolfe, assistant professor of German, and **Dr. Susan Wolfe**, special instructor in humanities, attended the Kentucky Foreign Language Conference April 25-26 at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Donald Wolfe chaired the 20th century German literature section.

NEW FACES. Two new employees have joined the clerical/support staff of the University. **Mrs. RoxyAnn Casper** is the new senior clerk in the University Library and **Mr. Jeffrey L. Crafton** is the new grounds maintenance worker.

She enjoys theatre, cooking, and music.

Mr. Crafton attended Hazzard Community College at Quicksand, Kentucky, and the Henderson (Kentucky) Community College, and received a degree in 1982 in forestry and wood technology. He previously worked as a color buffer for Camco Products in Henderson. He and his wife, **Mitzi**, a dietary technician, have a year-old son, **James**, and live in Henderson. He enjoys camping, hunting, fishing, and automotive restoration and repair.

CONGRATULATIONS to **Mr. Tyagan Miller**, a USI senior, and **Ms. Julie G. Davis**, a junior, who were named winners in the Alpha Chi national scholarship competition. Both are charter members of the USI Alpha Iota Chapter which was chartered early this year, thus it was the first time USI students had entered the national scholastic honorary society's competition. Mr. Miller, who is graduating magna cum laude in May with a double major in English and philosophy, was one of three winners of the \$1,000 H. Y. Benedict fellowships and will attend Washington University at St. Louis, working toward his master's degree in English. Ms. Davis is a chemistry major and was named an alternate recipient for the three \$600 Alfred H. Nolle scholarships. She would use the stipend at USI next year if a winner were unable to use the award.

Congratulations also to USI graduates **Mr. Walter Spencer** and **Mr. Jerome Peters** who have passed the CPA examinations in Kentucky and Indiana, respectively. Mr. Spencer passed with the highest grade in Kentucky; Mr. Peters ranked fourth highest in Indiana.

FUNDING APPROVED FOR SUMMER INSTITUTES. The Indiana Consortium for Computer and High Technology Education has approved funding for two USI summer institutes designed to improve the computer skills of elementary and secondary science and social studies teachers. Included is \$13,270 for two "Computer Enriched Social Studies" programs -- slated June 16-20 at USI and July 28-August 1 at Jeffersonville -- and \$7,455 for a "Microcomputers in the Science Laboratory" institute to be held at USI June 23-27. **Dr. Charles L. Price**, associate professor of science education and director of the USI Computer Literacy Training Center, will be the instructor for the science program. **Mr. Michael Russ**, a contact teacher for computer education in the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, will be in charge of the social studies program.

USI WAS MATH TEST SITE. The University was one of 14 test sites on April 26 when the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics held their 1986 State Mathematics contests. The USI program drew 247 students from 11 city and area high schools, participating in four test areas: algebra I, geometry, algebra II, and comprehensive. **Dr. Victoria Pohl**, USI professor of mathematics, was director of the contest, and **Dr. David Kinsey**, associate professor of mathematics, was contest site coordinator.

USI ALUMNI ELECT OFFICERS. **Mr. Ronald R. Bonger**, a 1983 graduate who now is a sales executive with Creative Press, Inc., was elected president of the USI Alumni Association at the annual meeting Saturday. Other new officers are **Ms. Augustina M. Kern**, a 1983 graduate who works at Keller-Crescent, vice president, and **Ms. Joanne E. Gonnerman**, a 1979 graduate who is with the Channel 9 public relations staff, treasurer. **Ms. Carolyn Klassy**, a 1979 graduate who is an appraiser with Don Cox & Associates, was re-elected secretary.

HISTORIC NEW HARMONY. Heritage Week '86 in New Harmony brought 4,578 people to view the demonstrations of the life crafts of the early 1800s. This first annual event devoted primarily to school children from southern

Indiana and Illinois and western Kentucky was an overwhelming success, with 4,249 youngsters participating when the original expectation had been an attendance of about 600.

The Atheneum now is open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily for the duration of the season, and will be the site May 1-14 for the International Kaleidoscope Exhibit. Ms. Cozy Baker of Bethesda, Maryland, author of Through the Kaleidoscope, is coordinating the free public exhibit, with sponsorship by Historic New Harmony. She is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records for the largest collection of scopes and for the ownership of the smallest and largest scopes. The smallest, which hangs on a pendant, will be on exhibit. There will be more than 250 scopes on display, representing more than 40 artists and craftsmen. In addition, A Touch of Glass of Asheville, North Carolina, will conduct workshops on the art of scope making at 3 p.m. Friday, May 2, and 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, May 3-4.
