OUR STUDENT BODY MAKES A VIET NAM CHRISTMAS WORTHWHILE FOR FELLAS OVER THERE

With Christmas just around the corner happy shoppers are hurrying to and fro around town looking for last minute Christmas gifts. Half across the world in an area not much bigger than the State of Illinois, our fighting forces in Viet Nam are struggling for day-to-day existence. Most of them won't make it home for Christmas; some may never make it at all.

They are fighting the dirtiest kind of war, a gorilla war. They may be there for another five years or more. Some have little or no contact with the outside world. Letters may come once every five weeks. It gets lonely on the battlefield. Some men never get over the despair of loneliness. This Christmas the students of I.S.U.E. sent forty five-pound boxes of food stuff and the like to Viet Namm. It cost \$1.45 to send each box, coming to a total of \$68.00.

Last Christmas another soldier received a box from home much like the ones ISUE sent. It contained a can of Pork'n beans, a can of pickles, and a can of salmon. He didn't have many facilities to cook his Christmas dinner, but he used what he had. Those pork'n beans tasted just like T-bone steak, and it made him very happy inside to know that someone cared enough to send him something for Christmas. It made him feel loved and wanted.

This Christmas forty men will receive a small box which will be appreciated far more than anyone will ever guess, unless they have been in Viet Nam too. The men in Viet Nam need to know some one cares what happens to them. After all, isn't that what Christmas is all about?
