GERMAN CHRISTMAS SERVICE TO BE CONDUCTED BY REVEREND HAAS. The Reverend Manfred Haas,
recipient of an honorary doctorate degree from ISUE in 1975, will conduct a German
Christmas Day Service on December 25, 1975 at 10:00 a.m. in the chapel of St. Paul's
United Church of Christ, 12th and Michigan Streets in Evansville. The German Church
Service, held on Good Friday and Christmas Day, has become a tradition in the
community over the past several years. For those in Evansville of German descent,
the service marks a journey into old-time family traditions; and for German students,
it provides an opportunity to experience a church service as it would be conducted
in Germany, with respect to liturgy, hymns, sermon, and Holy Communion. *Charles
Lonnberg*, Director of the Library, and *Mrs. Lonnberg* will sing a duet, "Jesu Christuskind,"
the German translation of "Jesus the Christchild." All interested persons are welcome.

SEVEN ISUE ARTISTS AWARD WINNERS IN MID-STATES COMPETITION. Two faculty members, two art alumni, and three art students from Indiana State University Evansville received special recognition in the 28th annual Mid-States Art Exhibition competition sponsored by the Evansville Museum of Art and Sciences.

The Bronstein Purchase Award went to *John McNaughton*, Assistant Professor of Art, for "Wooden Hinge," featuring plywood and walnut. The award carries \$500 in prize money. The Museum Purchase Award was received by *Michael Elvestrom*, an ISUE student. His entry was a pencil drawing entitled, "How Often Have You Dreamed of a Castle and Me!" The award carries \$250 in prize money. *Jack Cascione*, Assistant Professor of Art, won the Red Spot Paint and Varnish Company Purchase Award for a serigraph, "A Dark Colored Glass." He received \$200 in prize money.

Other exhibitors were ISUE students *Michael Pittman*, oil, "Amerikan Genesis"; *Roger Sills*, oil, "Corrosion Pits on Stainless Steel"; and ISUE alums *David Leach*, acrylic, "Jane on a Clear Day," and *Mary Beth Will*, collagraph print, "Gershwin Mystique."

The show had 527 entries with 123 of those entries chosen for exhibition, and 22 of those on exhibition were award winners. The jurors for the show were Malcolm Lein, Museum Director, Minnesota Museum of Art in St. Paul and Clarence Bunch, sculptor and Associate Professor of Art at City University of New York.

LEARN TO PREPARE YOUR OWN TAX RETURNS. A noncredit class in preparing personal tax returns will be offered in January at ISUE. Local certified public accountant, Steven Farrell, will be teaching the course. Designed to assist individuals in improving their ability to prepare state and federal income tax returns, the course will cover sick pay, moving expenses, rental income, capital gains and losses, as well as itemized deductions such as medical, dental, health insurance, casualty losses, and contributions. Helpful tips on record keeping and other tax related matters will be covered.

The 5-week course will be offered every Thursday at 6:30 p.m. beginning January 8, 1976 in the University Center. Course registration fee is \$25.00. Registrations are being taken by the Office of Continuing Education, Ext. 363.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS.

FRANK L. STANONIS, Professor of Geology and Geography and Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics, spoke to the American Institute of Plant Engineers Tri-State Chapter 18 on December 3 at Das Kollker Haus. The topic of his speech was "A Look at Energy Resources: Past, Present, and Future." *Dr. Stanonis* has just completed a report on the present and future Fuels Situation for the Energy and Utility Regulation Advisory Commission for the Governor of the State of Indiana.

DALE SHOOK, Assistant Professor of Business, appeared on Channel 7 on December 4 with Steve Hall to discuss the impact of the recent wholesale price index decline and its effect on the Evansville area economy. *Dr. Shook* also joined four noted Indiana University Business School economists and a local economist from U of E on December 8 at the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce third annual Business Outlook Luncheon. The panel discussed and projected economic factors affecting Indiana and Evansville business conditions in 1976.

ROBERT E. MAYS, Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, recently served on a Department of Public Instruction "Visitation Team" which evaluated Oakland City College's Division of Education. *Dr. Mays* has also been selected by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools to serve on a special evaluation team that will evaluate a series of elementary schools throughout the North Central region.
