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Dr. Rice, Justice Shepard to be honored

980 eligible to receive degrees May 6

Some 980 students will be eligible to receive associate, bachelor, and master's degrees at the 1995 USI Commencement, which will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 6, in Roberts Municipal Stadium.

Honorary doctoral degrees will be bestowed on **Dr. David L. Rice**, USI president emeritus, and **Indiana Supreme Court Chief Justice Randall T. Shepard**. Justice Shepard, formerly of Evansville, will be the Commencement speaker.

USI's highest academic honors will be presented to **Dr. Charles F. Petranek**, chair of the Sociology/Anthropology Department, selected by his colleagues to receive the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, and **Mr. Chad J. Hartmann**, a Presidential Scholar and mathematics major who was selected by the Student Academic Affairs Committee to receive the President's Medal, the highest award given a graduating senior.

Mr. Hartmann and his former roommate, **Mr. Brent Auberry**, a political science and history major, will be the summa cum laude graduates for this year's Commencement, having completed their college careers with perfect 4.0 GPAs. Both attended USI as Presidential Scholars. Mr. Hartmann plans to teach and will return to USI in the fall to complete his student teaching. Mr. Auberry will enter Indiana University School of Law. He was the student member of the USI Board of Trustees the past two years.

Dr. Rice held faculty and administrative positions at Ball State University and served in Washington, D.C., as research coordinator in the Bureau of Research of the U.S. Office of Education, prior to taking over leadership at USI in 1967. He is a native of New Market, Indiana, and received his B.A.,

USI President **H. Ray Hoops**; **Mr. Bruce Pearl**, the Screaming Eagles men's basketball head coach and Division II Coach of the Year; **Mr. Mike Smith**, CBC owner/president; and USI students, alumni, and fans sampled the products Wednesday at a press conference announcing the new drinks.

"After winning the national championship title, we found we relished being first," said Dr. Hoops. "We are thankful to Creative Beverage Company for launching this first. As far as we know we are the only University to have its own line of soft drinks."

Coach Pearl said, "Creative Beverage Company told us every man, woman, and child in the United States consumes 50 gallons of soft drinks per year. I

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M.S., and Ph.D. degrees from Purdue University. He and his wife, Betty Fordice Rice, have a daughter, Patricia Denise Dawson of York, Pennsylvania, and son Michael Alan Rice of Indianapolis. Dr. Rice retired June 30, 1994, and the Rices live in retirement in nearby New Harmony, Indiana, continuing their active role with the community and the University.

Chief Justice Shepard is a long-time Evansville resident who, at age 40 in 1987, became the youngest chief justice in the United States. He served the previous 18 months as an associate justice and was a Superior Court judge in Vanderburgh County for five years prior to that. Shepard graduated cum laude from Princeton University and earned his J.D. degree from Yale Law School. Prior to entering the judiciary, he practiced law, served as executive assistant to the late Evansville Mayor Russell Lloyd for five years, and was a special assistant to the Under Secretary of Transportation in Washington, D.C., for two years.

Dr. Petranek is an internationally-recognized pioneer in the use of simulated games

to teach societal structure and behavior. He earned a B.A. in sociology, psychology, and philosophy from Aquinas College, M.A. in sociology from Western Michigan University, and Ph.D. in sociology from Florida State University. He taught at Cleveland State University for three years, then joined the USI faculty in 1973 and has been chair of the Sociology/Anthropology Department since 1985. He has directed evaluative research for numerous community organizations. His publications in professional journals center on his work with simulation and debriefing, but also reflect his involvement with hospice care on local, state, and national levels.

dation Board member since 1981 and his wife has shared with him the efforts such as planning and raising funds for the University Home, providing an annual scholarship to encourage Illinois students to pursue their ambitions, providing a state-of-the-art interactive classroom system in the Mitchell Auditorium of the Health Professions Center, and helping the Mid-America Singers make their Spring Break trip to Poland, among others.

Dr. Mays began teaching at USI in 1973 and annually oversees the placement of more than 500 students in field experiences. The student-teaching program he initiated and oversees was recognized by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education 15 years ago as one of the top 35 in the nation, out of more than 900 programs considered. He also has been honored for his long-time work with the Head Start program and was chosen by for-

mer Governor Robert D. Orr to serve as a conference evaluator for the Governor's White House Conference on Children and Youth. He was one of six selected by the Indiana Department of Education to evaluate the state's Prime Time program and he currently serves on a U.S. Department of Education review panel for special programs such as Upward Bound, Talent Search, Educational Opportunity centers, and Special Services for Disadvantaged Students.

Hall's service to the University began in his undergraduate years, including being appointed by the governor as the first student trustee to represent the Evansville campus on the Indiana State University Board. He was a leader with various student groups and continues that affiliation through the USI Alumni Association, assisting with the USI Phonathon and many career development programs -- Career Exploration, Alumni Career Workshop, and Day on the Job, among

others. He also is still active with Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity and continues to be one of USI's "biggest cheerleaders" in the community and Tri-State.

Ms. Becker has worked for many years in the Indiana General Assembly on programs to improve and sustain USI. She was instrumental in the University achieving status as an independent institution, having guided legislation creating a Board of Incorporators for a Separate State University in Southwestern Indiana in 1984 and the following year, worked for passage of legislation establishing the University of Southern Indiana. She was first elected to the State House of Representatives in 1981 and currently is chair of the House Public Health Committee and a member of the Courts and Criminal Code Committee and the Public Safety Committee. She is a long-time board member of Ark Crisis Prevention Nursery and advisory board member for St. Mary's Medical Center.
