Academic Skills coordinator retiring



Ms. Carolyn Smith, coordinator and lecturer in Academic Skills, will retire after 10 years employment at USI. A reception in her honor will be held from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, January 31, in Carter Hall.

When Carolyn came to work in July 1989, Academic Skills was located in three rooms on the second floor of Rice Library with one secre-

tary, about 10 tutors, and a few part-time instructors. This year, the office has two locations with six full-time employees, 34 part-time employees, 70 tutors, and a secretary.

Ms. Smith said, "I have been very fortunate to have the support of a true team of dedicated individuals in Academic Skills and the confidence and support of supervisors and administration. The accomplishments of Academic Skills can be directly traced to the dedication and hard work of this team and the unwavering support of the administration. Like Academic Skills, USI's greatest asset is its people."

In the community, Ms. Smith has been active at St. Paul's Episcopal Church acting as a lay reader and chairing several committees. As a member of the College Reading and Learning Association, she served as leader of Learning Assistance Center Management Interest Group and as chair of the Learning Assistance Design and Development Task Force.

Ms. Sandra Hermann, director of University Division, said, "Carolyn organized the department from one that offered services to under-prepared students to a comprehensive collection of programs to support the academic success of all students. Under her leadership, Placement Testing has moved from a four-hour, paper/pencil ordeal to a time frame and a computerized format that serves students' needs. A satellite office has been opened to serve students in housing during evenings and weekends. This list could go on and on. Carolyn is a person of conviction who stands her ground, but she's also a great road-trip companion, an inveterate traveler, a voracious reader, and a sharp wit. I'm losing a thorough professional, and I'm also losing a friend who's listened to me, laughed with and at me, and always kept me thinking. Where Carolyn is, it will never be dull. And wherever she is, she'll always be planning for a new destination."

Ms. Smith is relocating to southeastern Missouri to be near her grandchildren. She also has plans to write. "I have had modest success with short stories, but I want to focus on the novel. In addition to writing, I will travel, play tennis, do some hiking and fishing, paint and sketch, and probably become involved in the community," said Ms. Smith.
