McCarron wins award

Mr. Craig McCarron, instructor in mathematics, is the inaugural winner of the H. Lee Cooper Core Curriculum Teaching Award presented by the University Core Council and Evansville philanthropist H. Lee Cooper.

The award, focusing exclusively on teaching, honors a faculty member whose work in University Core courses has been especially creative and successful in furthering UCC goals.

In nominating McCarron for the award, his colleague, **Dr. Kathy Rodgers**, associate chair of mathematics, wrote:

"Ninety percent of Mr. McCarron's teaching assignments are courses that satisfy the math component of the UCC; however, it is Math 108, Survey of Mathematics, that showcases Mr. McCarron's teaching techniques and enables him to make mathematical converts of even the least suspecting of his students.

"A typical McCarron class would likely include a slide of a provocative question, a listing of real-life data, or an historical vignette pertaining to the concept being taught. At the same time, Mr. McCarron would be engaging his students with stimulating questions or using manipulatives to model a concept....

"Even in what some perceive as a rigid discipline, he finds opportunities to reward and praise creative approaches to problem-solving. His love of mathematics and his enthusiasm are contagious. As a result, his students complete the math component of the University Core Curriculum with a greater appreciation for scientific inquiry and logical thinking,

a deeper understanding and appreciation for mathematics, and the realization that their instructor has sacrificed his personal time for their enrichment."

The H. Lee Cooper Core Curriculum Teaching Award and a commemorative plaque will be presented to McCarron at the Fall Faculty and Administrative Staff Meeting, which will begin at 8:15 a.m. Monday, August 20, in Carter Hall.

The Cooper award includes a \$1,500 stipend plus additional monies to support travel, professional development, or classroom needs.

As this year's winner, McCarron also will deliver a presentation to the USI community during the 2001-2002 academic year. A date for the presentation has not been selected, but his general topic will be "learning from failure."

McCarron taught part-time on campus before joining the USI faculty full-time in 1997.

He holds an A.B. in mathematics from Princeton and a M.Ed. from Harvard.

AAHE forum director to speak at fall meeting

The director of the Forum on Faculty Roles and Rewards at the American Association of Higher Education (AAHE) will be the guest speaker at the Fall Faculty and Administrative Staff Meeting Monday, August 20.

Dr. R. Eugene Rice's topic will be "The Changing Faculty Role." His presentation is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. The meeting will begin at 8:15 a.m. in Carter Hall.

In addition to serving as director of the forum in Washington, D.C., Rice is an AAHE scholar-in-residence and provides leadership for the New Pathways project "Academic Careers for a New Century: From Inquiry to Practice." He also serves on the Provost's advisory panel on teaching at Ohio State University and as a member of the National Advisory Council of the Campus Compact.

A recipient of the Academic Leadership Award from the Council of Independent Colleges, which recognized his "exemplary contribution to American higher education," Rice also received the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education's Mina Shaughnessy Scholars Award to write about his work on an organizational approach to faculty-related issues.

He has served on the board of directors of the Society for Values in Higher Education, on the national advisory committee of the Preparing Future Faculty project, and on the Accounting Education Change Commission.

In 1998, a *Change* magazine survey of America's higher education leaders recognized Rice as one of a small group of "idea leaders" whose work has made a difference nationally.

Before joining AAHE, Rice was vice president and dean of faculty at Antioch College, where he held a tenured appointment as professor of sociology and religion. Prior to that, he was senior fellow at the Carnegie Foundation, where he engaged in the national study of the scholarly priorities of the American professoriate and collaborated

with the late **Dr. Ernest Boyer** on the Carnegie Report, *Scholarship Reconsidered*.

During most of his career, Rice was professor of sociology and religion at University of the Pacific, where he helped initiate the first of the experimental "cluster colleges" and served as chairman of the Department of Sociology. His teaching and research focus on the sociology and ethics of the professions and the workplace. Rice holds a Ph.D. from Harvard University.

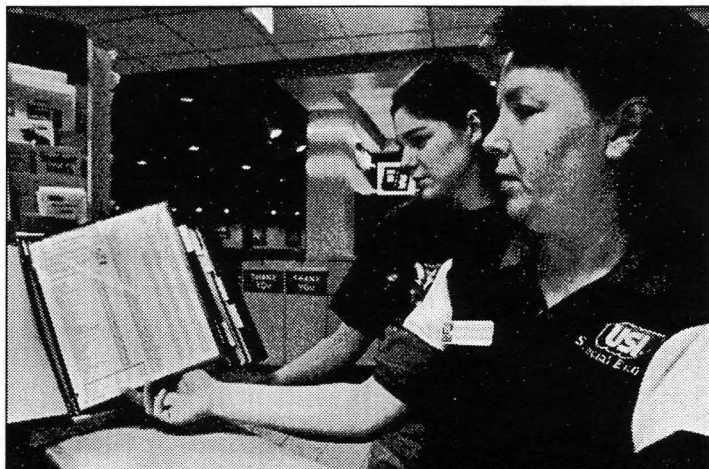
Web Tips

When placed and formatted correctly, photos on a Web site can make pages more interesting. However, if an image's file size is too large, downloading may take so long that visitors may skip over it.

When an image in FrontPage is resized, FrontPage does not reduce the image's file size. Even if a 126KB image is resized to a thumbnail, the file will still take up 126KB of space.

When reducing an image's dimensions, always click the "Resample" button on the "Pictures (or Image)" toolbar. Doing so will create a slimmed-down version of the image, which can be saved the next time the page is saved. The new version will probably look better than the resized original, and it will take up less disk space and reduce download time.

To display the "Pictures" toolbar, go to "View," "Toolbars," "Pictures."
