## USI to host fifteenth annual Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology

**Dr. Diane F. Halpern,** chair of the psychology department and professor of psychology at California State University in San Bernardino, is the featured speaker for the fifteenth annual Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology to be held at University of Southern Indiana's University Center on Friday and Saturday, October 16 - 17. Dr. Halpern will speak about "Enhancing Critical Thinking Skills in Adult Learners" at 7 p.m. on October 16.

Dr. Halpern is the author or editor of several books in the area of cognition and instruction. She received a Fulbright Award which allowed her to become the first American psychologist to teach courses at Moscow State University. She is the past president of the Society for the Teaching of Psychology and president elect of the Western Psychological Association.

Dr. Halpern has won awards for her teaching and research, including the 1998 Distinguished Teaching Award from the American Psychological Foundation, the 1997 Career Contributions to Education Award from the American Psychological Association, California State University's Statewide Outstanding Professor Award, and the G. Stanley Hall Lecture Award from the American Psychological Association.

#### **National Earth Science Week**

The first annual National Earth Science Week will be observed from Sunday to Saturday, October 11 to October 17. As a federal resolution entered into the Congressional Record by Senator Ron Wyden (OR), and formally proclaimed by at least 14 governors of the United States, National Earth Science Week is designed to raise public awareness and appreciation of the important role of geology and other earth sciences in human society. Faculty and students in USI's Department of Geology have planned a number of activities to celebrate the week.

On Sunday, Oct. 11, Mr. Jim Durbin, assistant professor of geology will host a group of local Cub Scouts on campus and introduce them to aspects of geology and earth science.

Dr. Joseph DiPietro, associate professor of science, will schedule a presentation on the geology, landscapes, and peoples of the Himaylayan region. The date, time, and place will be announced.

#### Keep USI on the road

University of Southern Indiana license plates are available through the USI Alumni and Volunteer Services Office. By purchasing a University of Southern Indiana license plate, you not only show pride in the University, you provide scholarships for deserving students.

The Indiana General Assembly has enacted legislation requiring groups with special license plates to sell at least 2,000 of them from 1997 through 2000. Groups that don't sell the minimum number will lose their special plate. As a result, the red and blue USI logo would no longer be rolling down the highways, and even worse, student scholarships supported by these funds would be eliminated.

The special USI plates cost \$37: the \$25 scholarship donation for USI students plus a \$12 processing charge by the state.


To obtain a USI collegiate license place, contact the USI Alumni and Volunteer Services Office, ext. 1924, for a form. Complete the form and send it with your \$25 tax-deductible contribution to USI License Plates, USI Alumni Association, Wright Administration Building. USI will return an official certificate entitling you to receive a USI license plate. Present the certificate to your local license branch when you purchase or renew your plates. A \$12 processing fee will be charged at that time along with normal state-assessed fees.

If you are a USI graduate, an annual donation of \$25 makes you an active member of the USI Alumni Association. When you buy a license plate, your \$25 scholarship contribution fulfills that membership requirement.
