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Passion of flamenco on stage at USI

Professional flamenco and Spanish dance company Ballet Español will perform on campus at 4:30 p.m. October 13 in Carter Hall.

The School of Liberal Arts is sponsoring the performance as one of the events in USI's THREADS initiative to offer more diversity programs on campus.

"The Ballet Español of Louisville provides artistic performances, audience participation, and cultural awareness, all of them of the highest quality," said Dr. Guillermo Latorre, professor of Spanish.

Based in Louisville, Ky., Ballet Español is the only Spanish dance company within a 250-mile radius of the Kentucky city. The troupe incorporated in 1987 to raise awareness and appreciation of the contribution of Spanish culture to the art forms of dance and music.

Ballet Español is directed by Mara Maldonado, who takes the lively Spanish art on the road for classroom demonstrations, workshops for teachers, and summer dance camps. She also has built an audience while performing in various venues in Louisville.

The USI program will allow the audience to experience the excitement and beauty of flamenco, according to Maldonado.

"This free presentation by guitarists and dancers from Ballet Español includes performance and audience participation," she said. "Join us for a glimpse into another culture."

The Ballet Español troupe has grown from two to 15 dancers. It includes two apprentice groups and teaches year-round flamenco classes to 60 students. The USI program is free and open to the public.

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Fellowships recognize faculty expertise

The inaugural class of Center for Teaching and Learning Excellence Fellows includes 10 faculty members representing diverse areas of interest and expertise.

The new fellows, selected by a campus committee, will provide workshops for the USI community in the spring. They also will serve as resources for other faculty members and will form the CTLE Advisory Board, guiding the program and gathering information about faculty interest in additional areas of professional development.

Recipients receive one-year renewable fellowships, and new fellows will be announced in July. Fellows also receive a certificate and a \$500 stipend for professional development.

The Employee Wellness Committee and Student Wellness Office will present a Healthy Hoe-down Wellness Fair from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. October 28.

Students in the School of Nursing and Health Professions also will provide health risk appraisals and counseling, and vendors will offer free health information in addition to screenings.

Healthy activities also are planned throughout the day. Free healthy snacks and chair massages will be available as well, and participants will have an opportunity to register for prizes.

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Campus snapshot: Academic Skills

Maximizing the potential of individual students is the goal of Academic Skills, recently relocated to the new Education Center.

Whether students are writing a paper, solving a math problem, or learning a chemistry concept, they can get help in Academic Skills.

"We don't do it for them, but we're here to guide them," said Judy Luther, coordinator.

Moving from the lower level of the Orr Center to the first floor of the new building, Academic Skills has gained a room set aside for writing assistance, more computers, an office for adjuncts, and an inviting entrance that Luther believes will lessen student apprehension about asking for help.

Academic Skills offers guidance of several kinds:

- General Studies classes taught by adjunct faculty help students improve basic math, reading, and writing skills. In 2002-03, 1,012 students completed the algebra review course, and 302 students completed the course in writing strategies. Other classes include English as a second language, reading power, study skills, and career planning. New classes for this year will be in vocabulary and speed-reading.
- Writing assistance is available from student tutors who have completed a tutoring practicum course. One-on-one guidance assists students who are writing papers in any subject, not just English. Luther invites faculty to check with her about scheduling an office hour from time to time in the Writers' Room to offer guidance on their students' writing assignments.
- Tutoring is provided for mathematics, study skills, and certain other subjects. In 2002-03, 2,376 students made 11,988 repeat visits to tutoring sessions.
- Assistance is available for students preparing to take the Pre-Professional Skills Test required of all education majors.
- Through the ACHIEVE referral program, faculty members submit the name of a student who needs assistance in a particular course. An instructional specialist in Academic Skills follows up with the student. In 2002-03, faculty referred 90 students.
- Supplemental Instruction provides a format for study groups led by a student who has previously done well in a course. In 2002-03, there were 665 50-minute sessions for nine different courses.

The administration of placement testing is another responsibility of Academic Skills.

This year the department offers a series of eight 30-minute Student Success Workshops, an outgrowth of the concept of brown bag seminars. Topics include test anxiety and time management. Luther said faculty members are welcome to attend these workshops to share success tips with students.

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Conference focusing on early education

The 13th annual Early Childhood Education Conference, for those working with children through age 8, will be held from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Saturday, October 4, in the Education Center.

Dr. J. Ron Lally, director of child and family programs at WestEd, an educational research and development laboratory in San Francisco, will be the keynote speaker. "Competence and Vulnerability: With Infants Both Traits Must be Addressed in Care" will be the topic of his presentation.

For the past 15 years, Lally has directed the work of the Program for Infant/Toddler Caregivers, a video-based training program that includes the most widely distributed infant/toddler caregiver training materials in the United States.

Lally holds a doctorate in educational psychology from University of Florida and a post-doctoral certificate of infant testing from the Child Development Research Center in London.

The conference is sponsored by the USI Department of Teacher Education; Evansville Regional Association, a chapter of the Indiana Association for the Education of Young Children; Indiana Child Care Fund Board; and Community Action Program of Evansville.
