'97 freshmen present changing student profile

Freshmen help establish record enrollment of 8,300

Figures released Monday show a record enrollment of 8,300 students this fall at USI, up 7 percent over last year. The first-time freshman enrollment is 1,949, a 13 percent increase over last year.

Dr. John W. Byrd, vice president for Student Affairs, said "Using 1994 as the base year, USI is seeing an increase in the number of students and in the quality of students." A comparison with 1994 enrollment shows '97 freshmen are more geographically diverse, better prepared for academic

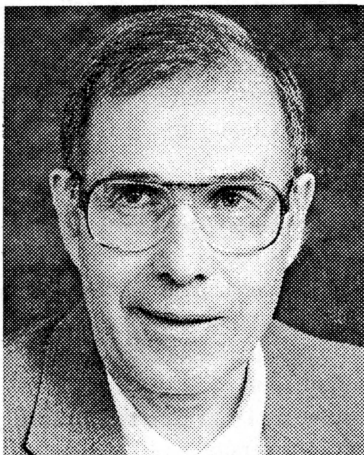
work, greater in number, more traditional in age (enrolling in college immediately after high school), more residential, and more are full-time students.

Enrollment growth has occurred both in and outside the region in the four-year period. Today's class has an increase of 288 students from Vanderburgh County, the contiguous counties of Posey, Warrick, and Gibson, and from other southern Indiana counties making up Region 13, one of the prescribed service regions for the Indiana Commission for Higher Education and the State Education Department. There are 410 more students from Indiana counties out-

Dr. Larry W. Arp, chair of the Information Systems and Business Education Department

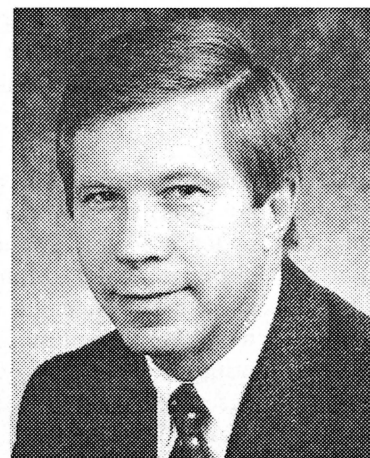

UC open house

NBD gift to be recognized

Shortly after the ribbon is cut at 1 p.m. Sunday, September 14, celebrating the University Center expansion, officials will move to the second level for a second ribbon cutting — the dedication of UC215 as a student conference room, courtesy of a \$100,000 donation to *Campaign USI* by NBD Bank. Participating in the ceremony will be bank executives **Mr. Scott Klueh** and **Mr. Charles Becker**. The room will become the NBD Bank Conference Room dedicated to use primarily by student organizations.

An open house will continue from 1 to 3 p.m. Sunday in the official celebration for the \$4.7-million University Center expansion. Marriott Food Service will have refreshments available on all three levels of the building.

The UC was opened in 1974. The expansion nearly doubled the original 52,000-square-foot facility. Features include an additional entrance on the south side with ready access to Carter Hall on the second level, now one of the University's largest multipurpose areas. Seating capacity for Carter Hall is 400 for dining and 600 for auditorium-style meetings, figures established as the comfort range after several months of Carter Hall usage.

side Region 13. Among them, Marion County has the largest USI contingent with 90 students enrolled this fall; 30 students came to USI from the Greater Indianapolis region in 1994.

Today's freshman class is better prepared for academic work. In 1997, 25 percent qualified for top academic awards, compared to 18.5 percent in 1994. More are living on campus, with residential students increasing more than 82 percent since '94. Campus housing is at capacity, even with five buildings added this fall. More than 2,000 students now live on campus, 114 live in apartments off campus owned by USI, and another 300 students live in apartments

in Evansville leased by the University.

Retention also is improving with the number of students who continue at USI increasing at all class levels. The number of full-time students increased by 726 this year, up 34 percent from 1994. There is an increase of 333 female students, 204 male students, with females continuing to carry a 60 percent majority overall. Minority and international students make up five percent of '97 enrollment.

Child care symposium slated

Mr. Fisher grew up in Evansville and attended the University from fall 1970 to August 1973 after serving in the U.S. Air Force. His father was Willard E. Southern Indiana Japanese School opens:

Area education and business leaders privately celebrated the first day of Japanese Saturday School on September 6 with enrolled students, parents, and company officials representing the school's board. The school is housed at the Evansville Day School and operated by USI, with a primary purpose of furthering educational opportunities in Japanese language and culture for students living in southern Indiana and the surrounding region. The school is open primarily, but not limited to, children whose parents are employed by Japanese-capitalized and related companies operating in southern Indiana. The students will study Japanese, math, and social studies, using the same textbooks they would use in Japan. They will attend 46 Saturdays per school year. **Mr. Keietsu Nishimura** is principal of the school.

"The education the students will receive while their parents are employed in North America is an excellent opportunity for the youth," said **Dr. M. Edward Jones**, USI associate vice president for Academic Affairs and director of Extended Services. "Saturday school is designed to help keep them current with their peers in Japan and prepare them for return to Japanese schools and the important advanced education entrance exams."

group will move to Rice Plaza and the David L. Rice Library for the next ceremony at 3:15, then continue on to Carter Hall for the 3:30 p.m. Founders Day program.

Rice was a graduate of Purdue University and Wright was a graduate of Ball State University, where both held positions when they teamed up in 1967 to come to the 2-year-old Indiana State University branch campus at Evansville. They headed up the fledgling faculty in a vacated Evansville elementary school and stayed for 27 years to help realize what everyone acknowledges as Dr. Rice's vision — a university that one day will reach an enrollment of 10,000 students and serve the surrounding communities via all the people and programs available at a state university.

USI was moved in 1969 to a 300-acre campus and in the beginning, consisted of the combined administration building and science center. The University became a separate state institution in 1985 and recently broke ground on a new Liberal Arts Center, which will become the eighth major complex on campus. Fall enrollment topped 8,200.

Schmidt is a Fort Wayne native who gradually worked his way down the state via education (Ball State University) and Air Force duty (Bunker Hill, now Grissom Air Force Base). He jokes that he got to Evansville and could go no further, halted by the Ohio River, but says he has "come to the realization this is the place I want to be — since I've already spent half my life here."

USI, he said, "has always provided challenges, challenges that continue to grow. But it is a very positive work environment and one of the joys has been the support we receive from the community and the legislature."

Schmidt received bachelor and master's degrees from Ball State prior to joining the USI staff in 1972 as chief accountant. He became the University's first controller in the mid-'70s, a post he held for 12 years. He was named assistant vice president for business affairs in 1987 and became acting vice president for business

affairs prior to receiving his official appointment in April 1993.

In his early years, Schmidt was responsible for establishing the University's first accounting and budgeting systems and later led an administrative team that installed the first comprehensive administrative computer software system. In a dual role as a long-time member and treasurer of Southern Indiana Higher Education (SIHE), Inc., he guided the transfer of student housing ownership and management from SIHE to the University, accomplished in July 1994.

A civic leader, Schmidt is past treasurer and a board member of Raintree Girl Scout Council, the Evansville Blind Association, the Evansville Community Foundation Alliance, and the Posey County Community Foundation. He is treasurer of Downtown Evansville, Inc., and a member of St. Mary's Medical Center Advisory Board. He and his wife **Marilyn**, director of USI Career Services and Placement, live in Mt. Vernon, Indiana.

Arp received a B.A. from University of Northern Iowa, M.A. from Adams State College, Colorado, and Ed.D. from Utah State University, Logan, and says his hardest adjustment in coming to Evansville was not seeing wide open space. He said he expected to stay at USI three years, but "it was fun being a part of a growing university. We — he and wife **Linda**, a first-grade teacher at Scott School who is observing a 25th anniversary with the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corp. — like Evansville, we like the climate."

He has been active with various University committees, including being past president of the Faculty Council (now Faculty Senate) at the time that **Richard Landini** as president of ISU had decided that ISUE should not become an independent institution. "It was a period of change. There were a lot of reviews. It was a fun period," he noted, adding none of the things promised came to pass and USI continued its crusade for the independence which finally came in 1985.

Arp has been active in numerous profes-

sional organizations, including serving as president of the Indiana Business Educators Club, past president of Indiana Business Education Association, and Indiana representative to the North Central Business Education Association for two years. He was appointed in 1991 as USI representative to the Southwest Indiana Tech/Prep Association sponsored by Indiana Workforce Development and is vice chair of the Indiana Partnership for Workforce Development Leadership Board.

Arp said it has been a joy to watch the School of Business grow — faculty has nearly tripled since he joined the staff and curricula continues to be strengthened — and to see USI business education graduates spread through southern Indiana, playing larger and larger roles in the area high schools.

Arp helped establish the Computer Information Systems program at USI and was among organizers of the University's Distance Education Program (DEP). He continues to teach the only DEP computer applications course in the state, drawing enrollment statewide.

Arp has been involved in athletics and coaching since his early years of teaching and became an active supporter of USI athletics. In 1987, he was named USI athletic director and during his four-year tenure, oversaw among other things a re-emphasis on academics for USI athletes, a new PAC basketball floor, the installation of lights for the soccer field, and USI's sojourn into Division I soccer competition. He also was chair of the school's NCAA five-year self-study.

Arp returned to full-time teaching in 1991 and was named chair of the Information Systems and Business Education Department.

Dr. Kinsey has been chair of the USI Mathematics Department since 1989. He regards joining the USI faculty as a perfect fit for what he was trained and wanted to do, all the more remarkable for the fact that there were only two job openings in Indiana for math teachers when he left Indiana University in 1972. USI was not one of them, the post actually being a sab-

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Aakhus exhibition

The New Harmony Gallery will present the sabbatical exhibition of **Mr. Michael K. Aakhus**, USI professor of art, opening with a reception for the artist from 5 to 7 p.m. Saturday, September 20, at the Gallery. The exhibition will continue through October 29, with the Gallery open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

The works in this exhibition are oil paintings and intaglio prints that resulted from a spring trip to southern Mexico, combining fragmented images of Mesoamerican civilizations with extraordinary natural settings. The paintings reflect Mr. Aakhus' romanticized view of Mexico, revealing his spiritual and emotional connection to the land and its people, while the prints — completed as part of a series of two bookworks on Mexico — reflect a more narrative approach and combine Mexican folklore with contemporary Latin influences. The bookworks were done in collaboration with

anthropologists **Alan and Pamela Sandstone** and poet **John Gibson**, USI English instructor who accompanied Mr. Aakhus and a group of USI students on the spring trip.

Mr. Aakhus received an M.F.A. from Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, and has been the recipient of numerous fellowships, grants, and awards, including a Master Fellowship with the Indiana Arts Commission, a National Endowment for the Humanities grant, and USI Faculty Research grants.

Mr. Aakhus is planning the third annual Spring Break trip, March 7-15, to study Mayan art and culture in the Yucatan. The group will be limited to 15 people. Call Mr. Aakhus, extension 1853, for information.

batical fill-in which he learned of from a friend. But it was a fit and USI has remained so for 25 years.

Dr. Kinsey had received a B.A. from Manchester College, Indiana; M.S. from the University of Arizona; and Ph.D. from IU, and had been an instructor at Carthage and Millikin colleges in Illinois. He also was a National Science Foundation Fellow in the University of Illinois Summer Institute for College Teachers (1964-67) and Indiana Academic Year Institute for College Teachers ('68-69) at Indiana University.

Dr. Kinsey has been active with most University committees and chair of many — Curricular, Promotions, Student Grievance, Student Academic Affairs, Faculty Senate. He also was faculty representative to the USI Board of Trustees and statewide faculty representative on the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for two years. He was USI site coordinator for the Indiana Council for Teachers of Mathematics (ICTM) State Mathematics Contest (1989-94) and has served as president of the Southwest ICTM. He also was active with the USI Campus

Ministry and a member of Indiana Commission of United Ministries in Higher Education for many years.

The Kinseys lived in Mt. Vernon while their children — son **Andrew** and daughter **Mary Chris** — were growing up. His community activities included various congregational positions with Faith United Methodist Church and numerous activities with school and community organizations. Dr. Kinsey's wife **Glenna** operated T&K Personnel in Evansville for 10 years and later worked at Bristol-Myers Squibb, retiring in 1994. Andrew attended the University of Evansville, where he was the second Ace Purple and now is a United Methodist minister. Mary Chris is an elementary teacher in Colorado.

A highlight of Dr. Kinsey's community service has been with the Evansville Association for Blind, which he describes as the "premier social service agency in southwest Indiana and one of the best in the Midwest." He notes most people are not aware of the scope of service provided by the association and he is proud to have been president of its board at the time

they acquired the funding for the recent \$3.5-million, 50,000-square-foot expansion to the EAB quarters in Evansville. Dr. Kinsey said the years at USI "have been good to me...provided me with a lot of opportunities." He finds the students to be like an extended family. "They become pretty special," he said.

Dr. Gabennesch received a B.A. in psychology from Duke University, M.A. in sociology from the University of Maryland, and Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Kentucky, where he was a teaching assistant and summer school instructor.

He was acting chair of the USI Sociology Department in 1988 and has been a member of the American Sociology Association, Indiana Academy of Social Science, and American Humanist Association.

He is past president of Ohio Valley Hospice and the Indiana Association of Hospice and a member of the National Hospice Association and the Communal Studies Association.
