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Open Society Institute Individual Project fellowships

The Open Society Institute (OSI) is a private operating and grant-making foundation which fosters the development of open society around the world. Broadly speaking, an open society is characterized by a reliance on the rule of law, the existence of a democratically elected government, a diverse and vigorous civil society, and respect for minorities and minority opinions.

OSI funding through Individual Project Fellowships (IPF) supports individuals whose work furthers the development of open society. IPF support efforts to counteract the following:

- * the intrusion of marketplace values on professional standards and values in law, medicine, journalism, and other inappropriate areas;
- * social and economic inequities brought about by market fundamentalism, such as unequal educational or employment opportunities for inner-city youth; and
- * the unintended negative consequences of perhaps well-intended policies, such as the excessive reliance on a criminal justice approach to combating drug abuse, which has led to a negative impact on public health.

Other IPF program concerns include but are not limited to care of the dying, access to justice, campaign finance reform, reproductive health and rights, and fair treatment for immigrants.

OSI Individual Project Fellowships are awarded twice annually, for a term of up to 18 months. Awards range from \$15,000 to \$100,000. Applications are due December 15, 1999. 2000 NEH Summer Stipends Program

The National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends Program made 130 awards for summer 1999. The 2000 competition is beginning. Applicants must submit their application to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs by September 13, 1999. Any eligible faculty or staff member with a humanities project may apply for an NEH Summer Stipend.

The program award is \$4,000 for two consecutive and uninterrupted months of full-time independent study or research. No travel supplement will be available. USI may submit two nominations, of which one must be a junior faculty member (academic applicants at the rank of assistant professor or instructor who are at comparably early stages of their careers). Those holding the rank of associate professor or professor are considered senior nominees.

Non-faculty college and university staff members are eligible for the summer stipends programs and may apply without nomination provided they will not be teaching during the 1999-2000 academic year. They should send their applications directly to the NEH.

Ms. Schuler began employment with USI in 1974 as a secretary in the library's Circulation Department, then in 1975 transferred to the Technical Services Department.



The article analyzes the turn-of-the-century novel *Knights in Fustian* by the Hoosier writer Caroline Krout and offers insights into why most Indiana Republicans believed that many of their Democratic neighbors were involved in disloyal activities and conspiracies during the Civil War.
