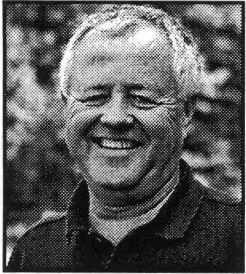

Brown, Goss, Marr to be honored upon retirement

Three retiring faculty members will be honored during a Faculty Senate meeting from 3 to 4:30 p.m., Thursday, April 19, in the University Center's Carter Hall. A special tribute to Mr. James P. Brown, Mr. Larry D. Goss, and Dr. Jackson L. Marr is planned for 3:15 p.m.

■ **Mr. James P. Brown**, golf coach and academic advisor to student athletes, is retiring after more than 30 years with the University. He joined USI as a physical education instructor in 1970; became the men's golf coach in 1977; and became the women's golf coach in 1995 after helping to organize the program.

During his tenure, Brown also served as head baseball coach, assistant basketball coach, sports information director, and intramural director. He earned a master's degree in physical education from Indiana University in 1968. Brown and his wife Anita reside in Evansville.

■ **Mr. Larry D. Goss**, professor of engineering technology, is retiring after nearly 26 years of service to the University. He joined the faculty in 1975 as an associate professor of engineering technology after earning an M.S. at Purdue University in 1966; teaching at West Virginia Institute of Technology, Oklahoma State University, and Purdue; and working as a project engineer for Bendix Corp.

He earned an M.S.+24 from Purdue's College of Graduate Studies and has taught engineering graphics and computer-aided design since 1963. Goss was named this year's recipient of the Orthogonal Medal, an award made annually by North Carolina State University to honor an individual for lifetime contributions to the profession of graphic communications. He and his wife Rena reside in Evansville.

■ **Dr. Jackson L. Marr**, associate professor of biology and faculty athletics representative, is retiring from the University after nearly 30 years. He joined USI as an associate professor of biology in 1971, the year he earned a Ph.D. at Iowa State University, where he taught anatomy, physiology, and zoology as an instructor and graduate assistant.

During his tenure, Marr also served as chairman of USI's Biology Department, where he has taught parasitology, anatomy, and histology. He and his wife Barbara reside in Evansville.

A reception honoring the retirees will follow the Faculty Senate meeting.

USI to host teleconference

On Wednesday, April 18, USI will join more than 2,000 organizations across the United States and Canada as a local host for the Hospice Foundation of America's eighth annual Living With Grief teleconference. "Caregiving and Loss: Family Needs, Professional Responses," a live-via-satellite teleconference, will examine ways that professionals can better understand and respond to the needs of family caregivers. The program will be broadcast from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. in Forum I of the Wright Administration Building.

"It is estimated that there are more than 25 million family caregivers in this country providing 80 percent of home-care services. In many cases this valuable work is unrecognized," commented Jack D. Gordon, chairman of the Hospice Foundation of America. "Caregiving is especially challenging for those coping with terminal illness and facing end-of-life decisions. It's important for healthcare professionals to understand the unique needs of family caregivers and assist them in ways that will provide support and understanding."

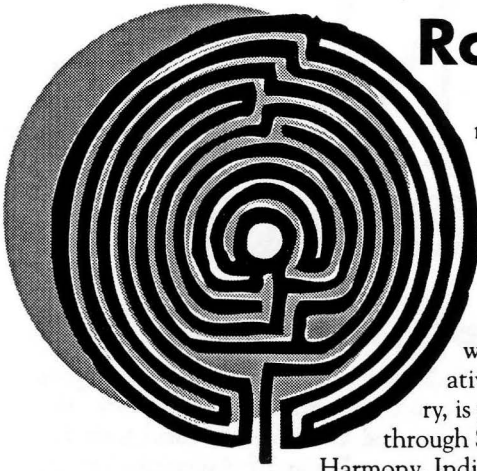
This teleconference will offer insight and practical suggestions for those assisting family caregivers as they respond to the challenges of caregiving, make critical end-of-life decisions, and cope with their grief. The program will be moderated by Cokie Roberts of ABC News and will feature a distinguished panel of experts, with a special message from former First Lady Rosalynn Carter.

The panel will include Kenneth J. Doka, Ph.D., Lutheran minister and professor of gerontology at the College of New Rochelle; Bernice Catherine Harper, MSW, medical care advisor of the Health Care Financing Administration; Carol Levine, MA, director of the Families and Health Care Project of the United Hospital Fund; Susan Reinhard, RN, Ph.D., executive director of the Center for Medicare Education, Institute for the Future of Aging Services; and Myrl Weinberg, CAE, president of the National Health Council.

Humanities center provides lecturers

Since 1978, the National Humanities Center has welcomed more than 800 Fellows into residence for a year of research, writing, and collegial interdisciplinary interaction with other scholars at breakthrough moments in their work.

Many of these Fellows - the authors of some 700 books, 50 or more of which have won scholarly prizes - are available to give lectures in the fields of history, literature, the arts, American studies, law, anthropology, women's studies, environmental history, and other humanistic fields.
