### 30th anniversary —

### **Documentary, Founders Day**

The hour-long documentary, "University of Southern Indiana: By the People, for the People," will be aired at 6 p.m. Sunday, September 10, on WNIN-Channel 9, telling the USI story in commemoration of its 30th anniversary on September 15.

On the anniversary date, the annual Founders Day reception will be held at 3:30 p.m. Friday, September 15, in Mitchell Auditorium, honoring 11 faculty and staff members who have been with the University for 25 years, including:

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history and director of the Historic Southern Indiana Project

Mr. James P. Brown, golf coach and instructor of physical education

Dr. Jane A. Davis-Brezette, associate professor and chair of the Physical Education Department

Dr. Susan L. Donaldson, professor of psychology

Dr. John H. Gottcent, professor of English and coordinator of the General Education Program

Dr. William J. Kirsch, associate professor of political science

Mr. John W. McNaughton, professor of art

Ms. Martha L. Niemeier, acting director of David L. Rice Library

Dr. Daniel C. Scavone, professor of history

Dr. Thomas A. Wilhelmus, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts, professor of English, and director of the Master of Liberal Studies program

Also, Mr. James T. "Champ" Douglas, custodial worker at the Physical Activities Center, joins the 25-year honorees to become the first from the clerical/support staff to reach that milestone.

The documentary was produced by Mrs. Nancy Briggs Johnson, director of Alumni Affairs. Interviews with 18 University and community leaders recall the efforts that made USI a branch of Indiana State University in 1965 and 20 years later, turned it into Indiana's fifth baccalaureategranting institution. The video will be available from USI to interested organizations after the Channel 9 airing. WNIN, a co-sponsor of the documentary presentation, will provide a free transcript of the show on request.

### 23 faculty members appointed for 1995-96

There are 23 new faculty members for the 1995-96 academic year. Two in the Athletic Department have already been profiled in *University Notes*. Those in the schools of Business, Education and Human Services, and Liberal Arts are listed this week. New faculty in the schools of Nursing and Health Professions and Science and Engineering Technology and in University Division will be profiled in the September 8 issue.

### School of Business —

Two new faculty members have been appointed for the fall semester in the School of Business, including:

Mr. Brian L. McGuire, a CPA with a background in information systems and health services administration, has been named an instructor in accounting. Mr. McGuire received a B.S. in accounting and an M.B.A. from the University of South Alabama in Mobile. A certified public accountant in Alabama, he formerly was executive director of Springhill Health Services, Inc., and administrator/management consultant with Mobile Heart Center. He was an accounting instructor (1991-95) at the University of Central Florida, Orlando, where he is completing work on the Ph.D. He also has a Certified Management Accountant (C.M.A.) certificate from the Institute of Management Accountants.

Ms. Jill L. Padgett, a USI business graduate, has been named an instructor in business communication. Formerly of Mt. Vernon, Indiana, Ms. Padgett has earned an M.B.A. from Webster University, an M.S. in athletic administration from

Eastern Kentucky University, and started work on an Ed.D. in educational leadership at Spalding University. She has held positions as a marketing instructor at Ivy Tech State College and business instructor at Oakland City College.

### School of Education and Human Services —

Five new faculty members have been named in the School of Education and Human Services, three in education and two in social work. They include:

Mrs. Susan H. Gooden, assistant professor of education, comes to USI from teaching and research associate positions at the University of Kentucky, where she is a candidate for an Ed.D. She received a B.S. and M.A. from Western Kentucky University, and previously taught at USI and in middle and elementary schools.

Ms. Patricia L. Marcum, instructor in physical education, received a B.S. from USI and M.S. from Eastern Kentucky. She was a part-time instructor at USI and previously was an instructor and head volleyball coach at Hanover College.

Dr. Randy K. Mills, assistant professor of education, was assistant professor of social science at Oakland City College the past 12 years and also taught part-time at the University of Evansville, Vincennes University, and for 10 years in Loogootee schools. He received a B.A. from Oakland City and M.A.T. and Ed.D. from Indiana University. He recently was awarded a CLIO grant by the Indiana Historical Society.

Ms. Cynthia Christy Baker, associate professor of social work, comes to USI from Florida State University, where she was associate professor of social work for nine years. She also taught at Tulane University, New Orleans, for nine years. She was a psychotherapist with P. J. Chokhawala & Associates in Tallahassee and was a field coordinator, supervisor, and therapist with a community mental health facility in New Orleans in the late 1970s. She received a B.S. in psychology/sociology from Louisiana State University, M.S.W. in clinical social work and third-year certificate in advance clinical practice from Tulane, and is completing studies for a Ph.D. in clinical social work at the University of Texas-Austin.

Dr. Karen Northcraft, instructor in social work, was a staff therapist at Southwest Indiana Mental Health Center since 1990 and an adjunct teacher at USI. She received a B.A. in secondary education from Salem College, and an M.S.W. and Ed.D. from West Virginia University, where she had taught for 10 years. Her past employment has included executive director of the Florence Crittendon Home, Inc., a 30-bed residential care facility, and assistant director of a children's home, both in Wheeling, West Virginia.

### School of Liberal Arts —

Five new faculty members have been appointed in the School of Liberal Arts, including Dr. Margaret Skoglund, associate professor of art and chair of the Art and Music Department. Dr. Skoglund was assistant professor of art history at the University of Central Florida, Orlando, where she had taught since 1977. She was director/lecturer for UCF summer honors programs for study in Italy and director/lecturer for about 15 years for annual Mexican tours. She received a B.S. in English from Southeast Missouri State University, and M.S. and Ph.D. in art history from the

University of Missouri.

Also appointed are Mr. Stephen R. Adkins, assistant professor of theatre/technical director; Dr. Robert A. Carroll, associate professor of communications; Dr. Juliana Staff, visiting assistant professor in French; and Ms. Terri L. Watson, instructor in sociology.

Mr. Adkins, who spent the summer of 1994 at The New Harmony Theatre, also has done work at Memphis State University, Marshall University, Peabody Hotel in Memphis, Alice Lloyd College, and most recently, Boarshead Tavern in Lansing, Michigan. He received a B.F.A. in technical theatre from Marshall and M.F.A. in scenic design from Memphis State.

Dr. Carroll has taught journalism and public relations at Northeast Louisiana University since 1970 and for nearly 20 years, served as the director of the school's Division of Public Affairs. Prior to 1970 he worked on newspapers in Louisiana and Arkansas; he has been a public relations consultant since 1979. He received a B.A. in journalism from Northeast Louisiana, M.A.

### Flu shots:

The Visiting Nurse Association (VNA) again will offer flu shots on campus for all interested faculty, staff, students, and retirees. The shots will be given from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday, October 17, in UC118. The cost is \$10 a shot, payable by cash or check. Registration forms will be mailed in the next month to give VNA an estimate on the vaccine needed.

### Handling University cash:

Pursuant to the directive of the University president, Dr. H. Ray Hoops, the only authorized agent to control, account for, and safeguard cash at USI is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash, disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstances is an employee to accept money in the name of the Uni-

versity without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received, except for cash received by approved satellite operations.

Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits. These departments are responsible for maintaining their own receipt subsidiary record on forms that have been approved by the controller.

Loss of any funds should be reported IMMEDIATELY to the Cashier's Office and to the University Security Department.

### Fulbright student program:

Applications are being taken for the Fulbright Student Grant Program in which students plan their own study project for one of more than 100 countries. Projects may include university course work, independent library and/or field research, classes in a music conservatory or art institute, or special projects in the social and life sciences. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, in good health, and normally must hold a bachelor's degree on the beginning date of the grant (fall 1996). In some cases, professional experience may substitute for degrees.

Full grants generally provide round-trip transportation, language or orientation classes, tuition, book or research allowance, health and accident insurance, and a maintenance allowance based on living cost in the host country.

Travel grants are available for Belgium, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Korea, New Zealand, Taiwan, and the United Kingdom only, and are meant to supplement a student's own funds for study. They provide round-trip transportation, health and accident insurance, and the cost of an orientation course abroad.

Teaching assistantships in English are available to Belgium, France, Germany, Korea, and Taiwan. Students planning to enter the teaching field are strongly encouraged to apply.
