UWE TIMM ENLOW DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR

Events continue in recognition of the visit of Mr. Uwe Timm, 1994 Enlow Distinguished Scholar and noted German author and screenwriter who currently is in Mexico writing his seventh book.

Two German films based on Mr. Timm's novels will be shown: *Der Flieger* (*The Flyer*), 7 p.m. Monday, April 11, Forum I, and *Kerbel's Flucht* (*Kerbel's Flight*), 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 13, West Side Branch Library, 2000 W. Franklin Street. (*The Flyer* will be shown with English subtitles; *Kerbel's Flight* will be in the original German.)

Mr. Timm is regarded as one of the strongest contemporary writers in Germany. In the '60s, he was part of the left-wing student revolution in both Paris and Munich and his first book, *Hot Summer*, published in 1974, was considered the best of its kind by a student insider.

Now an observer of modern politics, he will be asked to apply his perspective to the new right-wing German movement when, as the Enlow scholar, he will present a public lecture, "Germany's Right Wing and the Challenge to Intellectuals," at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 14, in Forum I. A public reception will follow in the Orr Center.

On Friday, April 15, Mr. Timm will present a second Enlow lecture at 10 a.m. in Forum III, this time dealing with his literary efforts. "When Writing Turns to Film" will be a discussion

A teacher, psychologist, and historian who began his career in the Denver public schools, he has participated in the development of several national assessment systems such as proficiency assessment for professional educators and developmental assessments of young children and infants.

Dr. Hilliard has been a consultant with many school districts on valid assessment, curriculum equity, and teacher training, and recently served as chief consultant on the *Every Child Can Succeed* television series produced by the Agency for Instructional Technology. TRAFFIC ALERT UPDATE

The weather is a major factor in the plans to place the overpass beams at the Indiana 62 entrance to the University of Southern Indiana. The current forecast of rain has prompted construction officials to delay their work one day and continued wet weather can be expected to cause further delays.

The current plan is to place beams over eastbound lanes on Thursday, April 7, and over westbound lanes on Friday, April 8. The work will start at 9 a.m. daily and is expected to take a minimum of six hours to complete.

A highway spokesperson explained 11 beams will be placed each day. A beam placement will require closure of highway lanes for a minimum of 15 minutes. Once a beam is placed, affected lanes will be cleared of stopped traffic, then shut down again when they are ready for the next beam.

University safety officials advise USI-bound motorists to avoid the highway construction area for those two days. Westbound USI motorists should use the Schutte Road/Clarke Lane entrance and eastbound USI traffic should continue to use the temporary entrance west of the overpass.

MAD FOREST

USI Theatre is closing its 1994 season with Ms. Caryl Churchill's *Mad Forest*, a unique exploration of the 1989 Romanian Revolution and the reign of Nicolae Ceausescu. The play is adult fare; it focuses on the lives of two ordinary families before, during, and after the revolution.


