Nine retirees to be recognized

University of Southern Indiana will honor nine retiring employees with more than 200 years of combined service at a reception Thursday, April 29, in the University Center.

These are individuals who have played major roles in the development of the University programs and curriculum, ranging from 1967 to the present," said USI President H. Ray Hoops. "These have been transforming years in the life of USI, and we extend our gratitude to these dedicated employees who have made a tremendous difference in our ability to provide excellence. We wish them well in retirement."

Programs exploring Alzheimer's disease

The University of Southern Indiana School of Nursing and Health Professions will sponsor two programs about Alzheimer's disease Wednesday, April 28, in Carter Hall.

The first, "Alzheimer's Disease Basics," will focus on a holistic approach to assessment and management of persons with Alzheimer's disease, stages 1 and 2. Dr. Martha Sparks, USI associate professor of nursing, will facilitate the session from 8 to 11:30 a.m.

The afternoon session, from 12:30 to 3:45 p.m., will feature "Living With Grief: Alzheimer's Disease," Hospice Foundation of America's 11th annual National Bereavement Teleconference.

In the teleconference, Cokie Roberts of ABC News will moderate an expert panel discussing what is known medically about the diagnosis, progression, and treatment of Alzheimer's disease. The panel also will explore some innovative programs for patients and caregivers.

Grief issues, challenges, and opportunities faced by patients, families, clinicians, caregivers, hospice workers, and policy advocates will be examined as well.

A local panel of experts will respond to the teleconference and answer questions from participants from 3:15 to 3:45 p.m. The local panel will include Sparks, Dr. Kathy Elpers, USI associate professor of social work; Joyce Rhoades, Hospice services supervisor with the Visiting Nurses Association Hospice; and Shari Sherman, executive director of the Alzheimer's Association.

The teleconference is free. Registration for the morning session is \$45. Continuing education credit also will be available. The registration deadline is Tuesday, April 27.

Three honored as top athletes

In an evening that saluted 51 All-America, All-Region, and All-GLVC award winners, seniors Mike Arnold (basketball), Duncan Bray (soccer), and Jenny Farmer (cross country and track) were recognized as USI's top student athletes at the USI/Integra Bank All-Sports Banquet April 19.

Bray was named the USI/Integra Bank Male Student Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive year. Bray helped lead the men's soccer teams to a second straight appearance in the GLVC Tournament, a second-place finish in the conference regular season, and a 10-7-1 overall record. The physical education major

recorded a team-high 19 points on six goals and seven assists.

The native of Scotland also became the third USI men's soccer player to be named NSCAA Division II All-American, joining Stewart Dowd and Greg Henry in receiving the honor. He also was recognized for his achievements in the classroom and on the field by being named NSCAA Scholar All-America.

Bray finishes his career at USI ranked fourth all-time in assists with 23 and scored or assisted on 15 game-winning goals during his three-year career.

"Athletically, academically, Duncan Bray is one of the top student-athletes in NCAA II," said USI Head Coach Dan Hogan. "Duncan has been a pleasure to coach and is partially responsible for making USI one of the top soccer programs in the conference and region."

Farmer follows last year's recipient Shannon Wells to be named the USI/Integra Bank Female Student Athlete of the Year. She was joined by teammate Heather Cooksey to be named two-time All-American, earning honors in the 3,000 and 5,000 meters after last spring's banquet.

As a senior in cross country last fall, Farmer made her fourth appearance in the NCAA Division II National Championships and helped lead the Eagles to a third appearance during her tenure at USI. She also earned All-Region honors for the fourth time and All-GLVC honors for a third time this past fall.

In four complete years, Farmer has qualified for the NCAA II nationals seven times as an individual in cross country and track and is a two-time All-American, four-time All-Region performer, a 13-time All-GLVC runner, and eight time Academic All-GLVC award winner.

"Jenny graduated in December with a B.S. in exercise science after earning All-GLVC honors 10 times on the track and three times in cross country," said Head Coach Mike Hillyard. "Jenny was an outstanding student and a team leader that simply can not be replaced. Without question, she is one of USI's all-time greats."

A senior guard for the USI national finalist men's basketball team, Arnold is the second recipient of the "USI/Integra Bank Screaming Eagles Pride" award. Softball's Ginnie Roberts was last year's award winner.

Arnold, who walked onto the men's team four years ago, worked his way onto the team the first two seasons and finished his career by being a part-time starter at the point position the last two seasons.

One of the hardest workers on the team, Arnold posted career highs this past season with 3.8 points and a second best 3.4 assists per game. He also appeared in a 99 career games for the Eagles, started 15 games, and averaged 2.7 points and 2.0 assists per outing.

"Mike (Arnold) walked onto the basketball team as a freshman and worked his way from the scout team to being a part-time starter by the time he was a senior," said Head Coach Rick Herdes. "He has been a model student athlete on and off the court and is a true representative of what USI athletics is all about."

Achievements

Dr. Jeanne Barnett, professor of virology, and **Dr. Cindy DeLoney-Marino**, assistant professor of biology, had students presenting posters at the Indiana Branch of the American Society for Microbiology Meeting April 16-17 in Indianapolis. Barnett's student, freshman **David Isaacs**, presented "Effect of *Plantago lanceolata* on Growth of HSV-1 in ELVIS cells." DeLoney-Marino's student, sophomore **Meghann Schenk**, presented "Investigating the Role of Chemotaxis in Establishing the Symbiotic Relationship between *V. fischeri* and *Euprymna scolopes*."

Dr. Cindy DeLoney-Marino, assistant professor of biology, has received a \$20,000 "Microbial Biology Starter Grant" from the National Science Foundation. She was eligible to apply for the special starter grant that specifically applies to academic tenure-track positions as a result of the Postdoctoral Research Fellowship in Microbial Biology that she received at Loyola University Chicago 2001-03 before joining USI in the fall. Funds from the project will be used to purchase equipment and supplies to establish an independent research program. DeLoney-Marino's research project studies how the marine bioluminescent bacterium, *Vibrio fischeri*, colonizes its Hawaiian squid host, *Euprymna scolopes*. Specifically, she is investigating whether an attraction exists that helps the bacterium to localize to the squid to colonize, a process called chemotaxis.

Three members of the faculty presented papers at the Midwest Political Science Association Meeting April 15-18 in Chicago. **Dr. Scott Granberg-Rademacker**, assistant professor of political science, presented "Is Bayesian Analysis Superior? A Benchmarked Comparison of Regression and Bayesian Analysis on Incomplete State-Level Data;" **Dr. Mary Hallock Morris**, assistant professor of political science, "The Role of Service Learning in Attitude Formation;" and **Dr. Paul Raymond**, chair of the Department of Philosophy and Political Science, "Determinants of City Council Candidates' Campaign Activities."

Two faculty members presented papers at the Indiana State Political Science Association Meeting April 9 in Terre Haute. **Dr. Mary Hallock Morris**, assistant professor of political science, presented "The Power of Losing Coalitions: Agricultural and Environmental Groups in the Debate over Hypoxia." **Dr. Scott Granberg-Rademacker**, assistant professor of political science, presented "Not Dropping the Ball: A Closer Look at Junior High and High School Dropouts in Indiana."

Several USI faculty participated in the 2004 All Partners Conference, an annual statewide event sponsored by the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunications System and targeted to faculty, administrators, librarians, and instructional support staff involved in distance education. This year's conference, "All Hands Online," was held April 6 at Purdue University.

Presentations by USI faculty included "Partnerships through Streaming: Engaging Distance Education Students in Library

Research," led by **Dr. Kevin Valadares**, assistant professor of health services/administration; **Philip Orr**, distance learning librarian; and **Beth Thompson**, director of the Charles E. Day Learning Resource Center; and "Student Evaluation of Teaching in Distance Education: Is Your Program Ship-Shape?" led by **Dr. Charles Harrington**, assistant vice president for Academic Affairs; and **Dr. Saxon Reasons**, programming manager for Instructional Technology Services.

Additionally, the 2004 Indiana Partnership for Statewide Education Award for Support for Online Teaching and Learning was awarded to a team from USI. **Dr. Charles Harrington**, assistant vice president for Academic Affairs; **Dr. Karen Bonnell**, director of Instructional Technology Services; and **Dr. Saxon Reasons**, programming manager for Instructional Technology Services, were recognized for their work developing an online evaluation system for students enrolled in distance education courses. The system is in its third term of operation.
