



MACE BROIDE TO BE ISUE EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE. On October 17, Mace Broide, executive director of the United States House of Representatives Budget Committee, will be ISUE's executive-in-residence.

Sponsored by the Division of Business, the Executive-in-Residence is an informal program designed to stimulate students' thinking and interaction with top level executives in business and industry.

As committee director, Broide runs a staff of experts in various fields. He handles the administrative end of the staff and participates in some policy decisions. The Budget Committee is responsible for molding the two budget resolutions, due in May and September, that the House must pass each session. The committee is also responsible for making sure compliance to budget rules is achieved.

The former Hoosier has been executive director of the Budget Committee since June, 1978. His appointment to head the staff of 80 marked a return to government from which Broide had been absent for ten years. During those ten years, he was a partner in the now-disbanded public affairs counseling firm of DeHart and Broide. With Edward H. DeHart, Broide counseled some of America's leading business firms and trade associations.

In his previous government service, he was administrative assistant for then-Senator Vance Hartke, of Indiana, for nearly ten years. He worked with the Senate Committees on Commerce and Finance as well as the old Post Office and Civil Service Committee in addition to managing the Senator's office staff.

A journalist by profession, Broide served as campaign manager for the first two successful campaigns of Senator Hartke. He was Secretary of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee and has had other management positions in various Democratic campaigns, including active participation in presidential campaigns of a number of candidates.

Broide will speak at a luncheon open to the public on October 17 from noon until 1:00 p.m. in UC350. The luncheon cost is \$4.00. For luncheon reservations, call the Division of Business at extension 1718.

SATURDAY SEMINAR FOR SINGLES. The Office of Continuing Education is sponsoring an all-day seminar for singles over 21 on Saturday, October 18. This is the first time such a seminar has been tried in Evansville, though it is a popular concept in larger cities. The seminar is being offered because it is difficult for singles (particularly older singles) to meet persons of similar interests in positive settings.

The day should be an important educational experience in that many of the seminars are designed to help singles—specifically those suddenly finding themselves in a single state—to find a focus in life as a single person and to learn to cope with problems unique to singles. Examples of seminar topics dealing with single problems are Mortgage Money for Singles, Time Management, Choosing Child Care, Single Again, Financial & Legal Tips for Singles, Single Parenting, Cooking & Entertaining as a Single, and Sex & Singles.

Other topics include Dining Out in the Tri-State, Strategies for Coping with Stress, Risks & Rewards: Investing in the Stock Market, Basic Home Repairs, America's Religious Renewal, Aging Parents, Cameras, Fall Nature Walk, Assertiveness, Job Hunting, The Poet Speaks, Vacation Planning, Getting Into the Fitness Movement, and An Introduction to Transactional Analysis.

OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR BLUE CROSS BLUE SHIELD INSURANCE.
