USI Inaugural

USI's first Presidential Inauguration will be held at 3 p.m. Friday, March 17, in the Vanderburgh Auditorium, with the investiture of Dr. H. Ray Hoops as the second president of the University. A reception in the adjacent Gold Room will follow the one-hour ceremony.

The program is free but tickets are required to assure adequate seating; call 812/464-1755 for tickets.

Another free public event celebrating the inaugural will be a convocation at 10 a.m. Friday in Mitchell Auditorium, featuring Willie Morris, a former colleague of Dr. Hoops at the University of Mississippi in Oxford.

Morris was editor in chief of *Harper's* magazine from 1967 to 1971 and has since been an author and educator. He was at Ole Miss when Dr. Hoops arrived in 1988. Morris retired in 1990, and devotes his time to writing. He grew up in Yazoo City on the southern fringe of the Mississippi Delta and will speak on the topic, "The Mississippi Delta: The Most Southern Place on Earth." Morris is the author of two autobiographies, *North Toward Home* (1967) and its sequel, *New York Days* (1993), which give literary detail to his migration from Mississippi to New York City. A booksigning will follow the convocation.
