FACULTY COMMENCEMENT RESERVATIONS. The 1975 Commencement exercises will be held on May 8, 1975 at 6:00 p.m. in the Vanderburgh County Civic Auditorium in downtown Evansville. Over 400 students will be completing degree requirements this year. Alan Rankin, President of Indiana State University, will give the Commencement address.

Faculty and administrative personnel participate in the ceremony in academic regalia. According to ISUE Handbook, "All faculty members are expected to participate in the Commencement exercises and shall wear the appropriate academic costume."

Faculty and administrative staff are asked to complete the reservation form attached to the University Notes and return the form to the Office of the President before Wednesday, April 30, 1975. Faculty members and administrative personnel will assemble in the Gold Room of the Civic Auditorium on May 8, 1975 no later than 5:30 p.m. Bring the academic regalia with you. The academic procession will begin forming at 5:45 p.m.

Following the ceremony, a Graduates' Buffet will be served in the University Center cafeteria. Sam Cookman, Food Services Director, plans a large, tasty buffet with a beautiful ice carving on the serving table. The buffet is open to ISUE faculty, administrative staff and their families, and graduates and their families and friends. Cost of the buffet is \$3.50 per person and children under 12 at 10¢ times their age. Tickets for the Buffet are on sale in the Bursar's Office.

ISUE SECRETARIES HOST BOSSES AT LUNCHEON. The ISUE Secretaries will host their bosses at their annual Bosses' Luncheon on Wednesday, April 30 at 11:45 a.m. in the Rare Books Room. The secretaries are to furnish salads, vegetables and dessert -- and, of course, their bosses. This luncheon has, in the past, been not only delicious, but lots of fun -- so -- Secretaries, don't deprive your bosses of this spring highlight. HAIRSTYLE SHOW. The ISUE Panhellenic Council is sponsoring a hairstyle show on April 30, 1975. Mr. David of DeJong's and his staff will conduct the show. He will discuss current hairstyles, display pictures of hairstyles and do a demonstration cut and set. The hairstyle show will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Gold Room, A-34. Mr. David has had advanced training in new styles and hair techniques in schools at Savannah, Georgia and Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The show is open to all interested persons.

EAGLE GRAN PRIX TIME TRIAL RESULTS. The pole position in the Eagle Gran Prix will be held by the Science Club. The Science Club registered the fastest time, 42.26 seconds, in the April 19 time trials. *Wendell Crim* registered the individual fastest time. A member of the Science Club team, *Wendell* had a time of 39.6 seconds, 1.3 seconds faster than the qualifying time last year. Other team members are *Randy Oliver, Kirk Simmons, Mike Dunigan, Dave Dunigan, Ken Walter* and *Jack Anslinger*.

The Gaffers, the Chi Gamma Iota team of last year and the 1973 & 1974 Gran Prix winners, had the second highest time with 42.41 seconds. The Art Club came in third with 43.86 seconds.

In the girls' teams, Sigma Sigma Sigma qualified for the pole position with 53.54 seconds. Fibi Flyers came in second with 54.56 seconds and Alpha Sigma Alpha was third with 55.42 seconds. *Debbie Wilson* of the Alpha Sigma Alpha team registered the individual fastest girl's time with 50.3 seconds.

Races on Saturday, April 26, begin with the faculty vs. administration men's race at 12:00 noon, women's race at 1:00 p.m. and the Eagle Gran Prix 30 mile race at 1:45 p.m. In case of rain, first alternate date is Sunday, April 27.

FINAL WEEK OF ISUE THEATRE PRESENTATION. The final performances of "Veronica's Room," a drama presented by the ISUE Theatre, will be held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 25, 26 and 27. On Sunday, April 27, a special performance will be presented at the Playhouse for all Greek organizations on campus. This matinee, to begin at 3:00 p.m., is the "kick-off" for Greek Week.

The Evansville Chapter of the National Secretaries Association will conduct its Annual Secretarial Seminar on Saturday, April 26 in the International Room of the Executive Inn. DEVRIES INAUGURATED AS COLLEGE PRESIDENT. Dr. Ted DeVries was officially installed as President of Valley City State College, Valley City, North Dakota on April 17, 1975. Formerly Professor of Education and Chairman of the Division of Education, Dr. DeVries left ISUE last August to become the ninth president of Valley City State College.

Founded 85 years ago, Valley City State College offers teaching degrees for elementary and secondary levels with 16 majors and 29 minors available, a non-teaching Bachelor of Arts degree, a Bachelor of College Studies degree which allows the student to design a program tailored to his own interests, the Associate of Arts degree in 7 different fields, and a variety of junior college and pre-professional programs. Since the first class graduated in 1894, 18,000 graduates have received degrees, diplomas, and certificates.

CHILDBIRTH CLASSES (LAMAZE METHOD) TO BE HELD ON CAMPUS.

Two 6-week courses in the Lamaze Method of prepared childbirth will be conducted for area residents through a cooperative program offered by the Office of Continuing Education at ISUE and Deaconess Hospital. Classes will be held Tuesdays starting May 13 at Deaconess and Thursday starting May 15 at ISUE in the University Center. Both will run from 7 to 9 p.m. once a week and each is limited to 15 couples.

The Lamaze Method has been taught in the United States for about ten years and enables couples to cope with the psychological changes of pregnancy, labor and delivery; decreases fear and apprehension through education; and provides physical conditioning for the expectant mother.

Instructors for the forthcoming classes will be Paula Cockrum, certified childbirth educator, of ISUE, and Linda Simpson, R.P.T., asst. director of physical medicine at Deaconess. They encourage husband and wife to enroll in the class together so that the husband can give emotional and physical support to the wife during labor and delivery.

LAMAZE METHOD, CONT. To obtain maximum benefit from the course, parents-to-be should complete the program close to the expected time of delivery.

Those wishing to enroll should be about seven months pregnant, and must have signed permission from their attending physicians. Pamphlets with registration slips are available in doctors' offices, at Deaconess' Physical Medicine Department, and at ISUE's Continuing Education Department. Cost of the six-week program will be \$20.00 per couple.

MUSIC PERSONALITY IS GUEST ON CAMPUS. The one person who did more to influence the direction of music than any other single person in recent history will be on campus for a lecture April 29 at 8:00 p.m. in Room 126. Clive Davis created some of the biggest music talents of today.

Appearing in conjunction with the Ohio River Arts Festival, Clive Davis will discuss the inner sanctums of the recording studios. He will tell how a music personality is developed, signed, and packaged.

In 1967 Clive Davis became President of Columbia Records and overnight changed the emphasis from the over-thirties market to rock music and the young people. Clive Davis believed in rock music and sought out and personally signed such talent as Janis Joplin.

It was Davis' unique combination of creative sensitivity, business acumen, keen facility to recognize commercial sound, and his understanding of rock and other contemporary music that contributed to his success. Davis personally became involved in the acquisition of new talent and was a decisive influence in the signing of important young artists who were later to have world-wide impact.

The public is invited to hear Clive Davis in the 8 p.m. lecture. An informal question/answer session will follow.
