The USI Center for Communal Studies will sponsor a public lecture by Mr. Joe V. Peterson, an original member of the 1960s Jesus Movement who lived in radical youth and evangelical communes in Washington and Oregon for 25 years. He will speak at 12 noon Monday, February 5, in Forum I on "Communes and the Youth Movement from the Jesus People to the Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh."

Mr. Peterson now is at the University of Oregon, engaged in the first extensive study of the subsequent lives and attitudes of those who have lived communally since the 1960s. He is known in evangelical and academic circles for his inside knowledge and remarkably objective understanding of the hopes and fears of a generation which sought to realize the Kingdom of God on Earth, from the Jesus People to the Bagwan Rajneesh.
