UNIVERSITY NOTES
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CAMPUS OPEN HOUSE IS CAMPUS WELCOME DAY. This year prospective students and their families have been invited to join other campus visitors at the annual campus Open House Sunday, October 14, from noon to 3:00 p.m. Staff of the Admissions Office and student orientation leaders will welcome prospective students in the University Conference Center at noon. There will be a short program at 12:30 p.m. before adjourning for campus tours. AMIGOS will give walking tours of the campus originating at the UC Mall, or visitors may board the Royal Foods English bus on the University Boulevard.

Highlighting the day's activities are an Open House at Mid America Student Housing and at Sigma Tau Gamma's chapter house, a birthday celebration for the ten-year-old University Center, pictorial displays in the Library which document ISUE's two decades of growth, concerts by the Mid America Singers, guided tours of the Wells Fargo Fitness Trail, and numerous displays by student organizations. Computer demonstrations are planned in the Forum Wing, the Library, and the Computer Center in the Technology Center. Several demonstrations of equipment are planned in Engineering Technology.

The Secretaries of ISUE again will prepare old-fashioned apple butter on the lawn of the Eicher Barn. It will be sold for \$2.50 per pint, with proceeds to benefit the group's scholarship fund.

Concerts of the Mid America Singers, under the direction of Sue Schriber, will be at 12:30 and 2:00 p.m. in Forum One.

Members of the men's and women's Cross Country teams will begin an instructional tour of the Wells Fargo Fitness Trail every half hour beginning at noon. Persons interested in learning to use the trail should come dressed to run.

American Food Management will serve its generous Sunday Buffet from 11:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in the University Center Dining Room. Cost of the Buffet is \$6.35 per person. Students and their parents, as well as senior citizens, will be admitted at \$5.85 per person. under five free. Special birthday festivities for the University Center are planned for those dining at the Buffet.
