USI Theatre to present *The Tempest*

The USI Theatre's final fall production November 10-20 will be *The Tempest*, William Shakespeare's exploration of the dynamic relationship between nature and art.

The play follows the trials of a band of noblemen and servants, shipwrecked on a seemingly uninhabited island. Mysterious events both enchant and frighten the unwilling visitors, unaware their banished duke Prospero inhabits the isle and has used magical powers to arrange this encounter. Prospero's desire to forgive the past is the basis for his plan; in executing it, he renews his hope for peace and understanding for mankind.

Mr. J. Steven Williford, USI Theatre director, is directing *The Tempest*. Scott Cummings portrays Prospero. The cast also includes Greg Appel, Jeremy Beck, Casey Bell, Carla Forston, Kelly Fritz, Danny Givens, Joe Greulich, Rick Hobbs, Cathy Kirsch, Jolie McCraw, Jackie Moore, Randy Murray, Bob Porch, Chris Riddle, Charles Schefer, and Timothy Paul Taylor.

Curtain time will be at 8 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, November 10-19, and 2 p.m. Sundays, November 13 and 20, at USI Theatre, 3001 Igleheart Avenue. Tickets are \$5 for the University community and senior citizens (60-plus), and \$7 for general admission. The box office will open at 6 p.m. on production days; reservations can be made by calling extension 1668 or by stopping by the Theatre Center.

Dr. Ozete given state award

Dr. Oscar Ozete, USI Spanish professor the past 15 years, was recognized October 28 in Indianapolis when the Indiana chapter, American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese presented him with their 1994 Professor of the Year award.

Dr. Ozete has taught Spanish at USI since 1980 and has been instrumental in the growth of the University's foreign language department from Spanish and German classes to a program that offers majors and minors in Spanish, German, and French; instruction in Japanese; and a Language and International Trade course which takes the student into an international internship.

Mrs. Sherrienne Standley, vice president for University Relations, called the awards well deserved, noting Dr. Ozete "is the epitome of the kind of teachers we prize at USI, the ones who can thoroughly involve their students by the strength of their own knowledge and love for their subject.

One former student, writing to the state groups in support of Dr. Ozete's nomination, best described student regard for their teacher when she explained they had nicknamed him "Papa Ozete." She declared, "Though he was an inspiration to me as a student, he is more of an inspiration now that I am a teacher."

combined leadership with a profound respect for the individual freedom of those who work with him."

Teaching colleagues from Indianapolis cited his teaching ability, his deep involvement with professional groups at all levels, and his impressive list of publications, including the textbook *Contigo*, for which he is co-author. Dr. Latorre described the textbook as "a model of its kind regarding clarity, precision and ease of use."

Dr. Ozete is a Havana native who grew up in New York City before matriculating at the University of Miami. He received his B.Ed. in 1960 and taught in Miami junior and senior high schools for nine years, then moved to the college level of teaching at Indiana University. He received an M.A.T. in 1968 and Ph.D. in 1974 from IU and taught at the University of Wisconsin-Madison for six years before joining the USI faculty in 1980.

Dr. Ozete has been a member or chair of many University committees, held leadership positions with numerous professional organizations, and has taken his enthusiasm for Spanish into the community, including organizing the annual Spanish Day Fiesta at USI for high school Spanish students.
