



HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION BUILDING TO OFFICIALLY OPEN FRIDAY. The HPER Building will officially open Friday, October 3. The University community is invited to attend and to participate in the ribbon cutting ceremony at approximately 9:15 a.m. Please bring your own scissors. Tours of the building will be given following the ceremony.

On that afternoon, from 2:00 - 4:00 p.m., an ice cream social at poolside in the HPER Building is being sponsored for clerical and support employees of the University. Department heads will dish up ice cream for the employees, and all University employees are invited to drop in during the two-hour period.

The Student Union Board is sponsoring the "HPER All-Niter" which will begin Friday evening at 7:00 p.m. and continue until 3:00 a.m. Saturday. The event will feature a reception for the University community at 7:00 p.m., followed by open recreation, demonstrations in all types of health maintenance and recreation possible in the building, a dance, tournaments, movies, and entertainment. At 9:00 p.m., Ken Weber, hypnotist and mentalist, will perform. The "HPER All-Niter" is sponsored to familiarize students with the building capabilities and to give them an opportunity to participate in every activity possible in the building. Though it is sponsored primarily for students, all members of the University family are welcome to attend.

The secretaries will begin slicing, peeling, and cooking the apples for the Fourth Annual Apple Butter sale sponsored by the Secretaries Club, early Saturday morning. The sale will be held from 11:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Sunday or until they sell out. A pint jar will sell for \$2.50. No advance sales will be available. Persons can inquire about apple butter after the sale on Monday, October 6, by calling the ISUE switchboard at 464-8600.

The traditional campus Open House activities will be held from 12:00 - 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 5. Though the focus will be on the HPER Building, many other activities are planned throughout the campus. The Sunday Buffet will be served from 11:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. in the University Center Dining Room. Special displays, including microform machines, will be set up in the University Library featuring old newspaper coverage of such events as Lincoln and Kennedy assassinations and the sinking of the Titanic. Informal tours will be conducted and a set of fine art slides will be on display in the front entry area.

Media Services will be open for tours in Room 221 of the Technology Building. Computer games will be demonstrated on terminals in Room 119 of the Technology Building. Civil Engineering Technology will feature demonstrations of electronic distance measurement, of flow measurement by venturi meter and rotameter, of liquid limit testing, of testing of concrete cylinders, and properties of structural joints and connections will be illustrated.

The Mid-America Singers, under the direction of Will Kesling, will give two mini-concerts at 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. in Room 126 of the Administration Building. A blood pressure clinic will also be held in the Administration Building in Room 30. Campus tours will be available aboard the Royal Foods double-decker bus. The public is invited to explore the new HPER Building as well as the campus.

HUMANITIES FORUM SCHEDULED. FREDERICKA SCHMADEL, instructor of German, will speak about the function of fairy tales as a base for many large areas of Western culture and civilization on Wednesday, October 8, at 9:00 a.m., in Room 350 of the University Center. During a year of study at the University of Munich, Schmadel wrote a research paper in which she identified major elements of fairy tale plot structure in the medieval epic Parzifal by Wolfram von Exchenbach and the 20th century novel The Magic Mountain by Thomas Mann. She will present parts of this research in the Humanities Forum along with major contributions of modern fairy tale theorists Max Lüthi and Vladimir Propp.

All faculty, staff, and students are encouraged to attend the Humanities Forum events.
