FALL REGISTRATION UP 13.86 PERCENT. A total of 5,265 students registered at USI for the fall semester, a 13.86 increase over the 1987 fall enrollment of 4,624. Degree-seeking freshmen led the categories -- 1,141 this fall compared to 876 in 1987, a 30.25 increase. A preliminary analysis of registration data indicates the increase resulted from both new-student registration and the retention of current students. The number of high school graduates enrolling from southern Indiana (Region 13) generally continued to climb. Daviess County topped that list with 51 students accounting for an 82.14 percent increase; other percentage increases ranged from 2.22 in Knox County to 24.29 in Warrick County. The 280 Hoosier students enrolling from outside of Region 13 is a 46.60 percent increase over 1987. There were 428 new students transferring to USI from other schools, a 22.29 percent increase. Other figures of interest include:

Operations have stabilized after the influx, including parking, with regular lots now able to accommodate all vehicles at various peak hours. Students, faculty, and staff are reminded that a registration decal required for all vehicles operated and parked on campus must be in place by Monday, September 19, to avoid parking tickets and fines. The decal -- blue USI on a red and white field -- does not expire and is not transferable. It should be permanently affixed to the lower right corner of the rear window (inside).
