RUSSIAN STUDENT DANCERS TO VISIT NEW HARMONY. New Harmony will be one of five stops that also will include New York City, Philadelphia, Indianapolis, and Washington, D.C., in a February concert tour for a Soviet student dance troupe. The Perm Dance Ensemble -- the first Russian student performers to come to the U.S. on a concert tour -- will visit New Harmony February 14-18, with their trip to the U.S. being underwritten in large part by **Mrs. Jane Owen**, a major benefactor and participant in the restoration of Historic New Harmony. The ensemble will perform at 4 p.m. Sunday, February 15, and 8 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, February 16-17, at Murphy Auditorium. Their repertoire will include excerpts from *Swan Lake*, *Raimonda*, *Giselle* and *Copelia*, in addition to a Lithuanian folk dance and other works. Tickets are \$6 per person and may be obtained via the order blank at the back of University Notes or from Historic New Harmony offices, the New Harmony Inn, or the Red Geranium Bookstore.

The local visit is being coordinated by Historic New Harmony, Red Geranium Enterprises, and USI, and will include tours on Monday of the University and the city of Evansville. The students are being given an opportunity to sample the extraordinary diversity of life in the U.S. They will visit universities, rural communities, and many historic and cultural landmarks, meet students their own age, and have exposure to many facets of dance in America. The students' visit is sponsored by Friendship Ambassadors Foundation of Upper Montclair, New Jersey, an organization which has sent thousands of young American performers to the USSR in the last decade. As a result of the exchange initiative proposed by **President Reagan** and **General Secretary Gorbachev**, Friendship Ambassadors will become the primary organization to receive Soviet performing youth groups in the U.S. Perm is located about 600 miles east of Moscow. The dance school has been recognized as one of the best ballet schools in the Soviet Union since dancers from Leningrad's renowned Kirov ballet company moved to Perm for the duration of World War II.

Tuesday, January 20 — Mr. Bob Brown will speak on "Wellness: A Balanced Life-Style," a discussion of how we can maintain harmony within our busy lives while trying to balance the emotional, physical, social, occupational, intellectual, and spiritual aspects of everyday living.

Wednesday, January 21 — **Dr. Skip Nesbitt**, clinical psychologist at Parkside Lodge, will speak on "What is Your Fix?" Do you eat too much, too little? Do you drink or smoke more than you should? Dr. Nesbitt will discuss compulsive disorders, their similarities, and how an individual can manage obsessive behavior.

Thursday, January 22 — **Ms. Jill Owens**, registered dietician at Deaconess Hospital, will speak on "Food, Food . . . To Eat or Not to Eat." Ms. Owen will discuss eating habits, nutrition, and safe dieting for weight reduction.

Friday, January 23 -- **Ms. Kim Sabo**, a psychologist with the Deaconess Concern Program, will speak on "Feeling Good About You." Each of us must manage multiple roles in our personal and working lives. Ms. Sabo will discuss personal expectations, the demands others place upon us, and how to feel good about you!

HUMANITIES FORUM. **Ms. Nancy Beverly**, assistant literary manager at Actor's Theatre in Louisville, will be the first speaker in the Spring Humanities Forum series.
