Crystal Ball: The Sky Is Not Falling on Newspapers," and at a noon luncheon. The morning programs will be in UC 352-353, and the luncheon will be in UC 350-351; all are open to the public. HUMANITIES FORUM REMINDER. Dr. Ben Eklof, associate professor of history at Indiana University, will speak at 12 noon Thursday, March 28 in UC 350. He will take a critical look at the quantity and quality of change in the Soviet Union's standard of living and how Soviet citizens feel about these changes. Dr. Eklof has lived and studied extensively in the Soviet Union.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Kenneth B. Settle, chairman of the Division of Business, will address the Downtown Optimist Club luncheon today on "Can We Afford to Trade Freedom for Security?"

Dr. Settle also is chairing a task force to prepare the Overall Economic Development Program Annual Report for the City of Evansville/Vanderburgh County. The report is required for consideration for Economic Development Administration funding.

Dr. George S. Abshier, professor of business, went to Washington, D. C. recently to visit with national legislators in support of the research and extension programs of the Indiana Extension/Research Support Committee.

On March 21, Dr. Abshier spoke to the Society of Professional Engineers; on March 23, he spoke to the Indiana Minerals Aggregate Society at Owensboro, Kentucky, and on March 5, he participated in a workshop sponsored by E.A.S.i.e., an organization of small business operators in Evansville. "Time Management" was the topic at each event.

Dr. Robert Gehring, associate professor of psychology, recently presented the following papers: "Recall of Silently Enacted Events with and without Verbal Descriptions," Eastern Psychological Association, Boston, March 22; "High Learning Rates in Research, Teaching, and Corporate Training," AT&T Technologies, Morristown, New Jersey, March 18; and "Research on the Maximization of Learning and Memory Through Computer Interactive Television," Xerox Learning Systems, Stamford, Connecticut, March 20.

On the same trip, Dr. Gehring completed a video-recorded study of educational computer interactive television at the Boston Science Museum on March 21. Finally, he visited Darrel A. Regier, director of the largest National Institute of Mental Health study, and obtained four videotapes of the study.

An article by Dr. Charles T. Barber, ISUE professor of political science, was published this month in the <u>Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences Proceedings</u>, third series, volume 18, pages 122-127. The article, "Indiana Partners and Sister Cities: A Comparison of International Exchange Programs," included discussion of the Evansville-Osnabruck arrangement.

On Sunday, March 24, Dr. Barber and Dr. Charles F. Petranek, associate professor of sociology, participated in the spring board meeting of the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences at Indiana Central University in Indianapolis. One outcome of the meeting was a decision to hold the 1986 annual meeting on the ISUE campus on October 3.

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, has had his chapter, "Communal Societies," published in <u>Built In The U.S.A.</u>, a new book by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.
