SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE. Dr. John L. Nethers, chairman of the Social Science Department at Ashland (Ohio) College and a professor of history widely known for his studies of and publications about the Amish in North America, will be the Scholar-in-Residence on Friday, February 12, sponsored by the Division of Social Science. He will lecture on "Amish Social Practices: Tradition and Change" in the 10 a.m. sociology class of Dr. Howard Gabennesch and on "The Amish Past and Present: The Role of a Minority Religious Group in Modern America" in Dr. Donald Pitzer's 12 noon history class. Both will meet in Forum I; all University faculty and staff members and the public are invited to attend.

A native Ohioan, Dr. Nethers' studies of the Amish began in 1959 when he wrote his master's thesis on "An Historical Study of the Amish in Holmes County Area of Ohio." He received his B.S. in social studies and history and M.A. and Ph.D. in history from Ohio State University. He taught history and social studies in public schools for seven years, then became a teaching assistant at Ohio State in 1961. He was at Murray State University (1964-66) prior to joining the faculty at Ashland.

Dr. Nethers has been granted study leave for the 1988-89 academic year and will devote it to the Amish, delving into everything from birth records to burial sites to focus on the changing social, economic, and political lifestyle. Amish communities can be found in 22 states, including Indiana, and Canada. Dr. Nethers, in a January interview in the Loudonville (Kentucky) Times, described them as "a unique and distinctive people" who "provide a fascinating source for historical study. The Amish are a living museum and stand as a link with America's past." Although there was a feeling the Amish was a dying community in 1959, "they've adjusted . . . they realize they've got to survive -- and they are," Dr. Nethers said.
