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FALL EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE. Raymond C. Egan, executive vice president of Mead Johnson and Company, will serve as ISUE's fall Executivein-Residence. Egan will spend the day working with business students at ISUE on Friday, November 19. The public is invited to attend his noon lecture in the University Conference Center.

Egan earned a baccalaureate degree from Trinity College and an MBA in marketing and statistics from Syracuse University. He began working for Bristol-Myers in 1968 and served as vice president for marketing of Bristol Laboratories from 1976 to 1978. Egan was president and general manager of the Bristol-Myers Pharmaceutical Group before he became executive vice president of Mead Johnson in January, 1982.

Mead Johnson was merged with Bristol-Myers Company in 1967 and today operates as a subsidiary of the parent organization. In 1978, Mead Johnson's marketing, sales, and research operations were reorganized into separate nutritional and pharmaceutical divisions.

COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE. More than 125 scholars, museum directors, communitarians, and students from as far away as Oregon, Massachusetts, and Israel attended the ninth annual Historic Communal Societies Conference at Shakertown at South Union and Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green, October 14 through 16. Numerous universities were represented along with representatives from 24 historic communal sites and four current communal groups.

The ISUE Center for Communal Studies, which is directed by Dr. Donald Pitzer, professor of history, co-sponsored this event along with the National Historic Communal Societies Association, South Union Shakertown, and Western Kentucky University. Radio and television coverage was given to several features of the meeting--a performance by the Shaker Singers of WKU, and interview with Dr. Yaacov Oved and Aharon Yadlin from two Israeli kibbutzim, and the tour of the Julia Neal Collection of Shaker materials in the Kentucky Library on the WKU campus.

Each person who attended the conference received a free recording of historic communal music titled "American Communal Music of the 18th and 19th Centuries" and a free copy of the NHCSA journal, <u>Communal Societies</u>, which contained essays on communal music from last year's conference at Ephrata, Pennsylvania. These items were compliments of two grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities totalling over \$34,000.

Next year's tenth anniversary Historic Communal Societies Conference returns to New Harmony, Indiana, where it all began in 1974. This will be a "World Utopian Communities" conference scheduled for October 13 - 16, 1983. Speakers are expected from Japan, England, Canada, Germany, and Israel as well as the United States. Faculty, staff, and students from ISUE are invited to attend and participate. Those wishing to present formal papers should contact the program chairman, Dr. Charles Petranek, associate professor of sociology, before March 1, 1983. Dr. Pitzer will be offering History 400 for students who wish to earn one hour credit for studies involving the conference.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Dr. Larry Arp, associate professor of business, was recently elected to serve as an International Director of the Administrative Management Society for 1983-85. Dr. Arp's responsibilities will include serving the needs of AMS Area 7 chapters which are located in Butler County, Ohio; Cincinnati, Ohio; Columbus, Ohio; Dayton, Ohio; Evansville, Indiana; Huntington, West Virginia; Lexington, Kentucky; and Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history, has been appointed to the editorial board of the <u>Indiana Magazine of History</u>, a 12-member committee of academic historians and historical society administrators. The IMH is jointly published by the Indiana Historical Society and the Department of History at Indiana University.

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, associate professor of sociology, presided at a session of the ninth annual Historic Communal Societies Conference at Western Kentucky University on October 16. At the conference, which was co-sponsored by the ISUE Center for Communal Studies and directed by Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, Dr. Petranek was re-elected to a three-year term as treasurer of the National Historic Communal Societies Association and made program chairman for the tenth anniversary conference to be held in New Harmony, Indiana, October 13 - 16, 1983. Dr. Pitzer was elected to another three-year term as executive director of the NHSCA and Dr. Petranek was selected as associate director to handle organizational affairs during Dr. Pitzer's spring 1983 sabbatical leave.

Library assistant Gina Walker, representing the University Archives, and four students from Dr. Pitzer's History 400 class also attended the South Union Conference.
