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USI BOARD APPROVES BUDGET, SETS STUDENT FEES, ELECTS OFFICERS

The USI Board of Trustees met in regular annual meetings July 8 at Cannelton, Indiana, and approved a \$28-million budget for the 1993-94 academic year, an 11 percent increase over last year's operating budget. University officials reported that state appropriations comprise 59.1 percent of the budget, with the remainder coming from student fees (36.5 percent) and other income (4.4 percent).

The legislature increased USI's appropriation in recognition of its enrollment growth. University officials said they will use the funds to improve the proportion of fulltime faculty, which has dropped to an unacceptable level the past few years. The University also will be able to begin structuring the Master of Social Work program so that classes can be offered in the 1994-95 academic year.

Student fees were increased for the coming year, with increases ranging between 5 and 5.5 percent. Fees for in-state undergraduate students will be \$68 per semester credit hour, up from \$64.50 last year. Fees for out-of-state undergraduate students will be \$165.75, up from \$156.75 last year. For graduate students, the in-state rate will be \$99.75, up from \$94.25, and for non-residents, \$199.50, up from \$188.50. The new

fees will mean an annual increase of between \$75 to \$100 for the average USI student. USI's fees remain the lowest of Indiana's public baccalaureate institutions.

Among other fee increases was a \$5 increase for athletic season tickets: for men's basketball, chairback seats will be \$50 and bench seats, \$35; for men's soccer, season tickets will be \$30.

The Board also approved bids to construct an elevator addition to the Administration Building. Deig Brothers of Evansville submitted the low bid of \$80,000. The addition of the elevator will assist physically impaired students, employees, and visitors. Bids also were approved to construct offices on the lower level of the Orr Center,

USI LICENSE PLATE
