ISUE STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT.

ISUE chemistry major, *Michael Kroeger*, was named the recipient of the 1975 Scholarship Award of the Tri-State Council for Science and Engineering. The monetary award was presented on February 18 by the Tri State Council. The scholarship is based upon the student's scholastic record, leadership ability, citizenship standards, and potential ability for success.

Michael, a Harrison High School graduate, is an honor student and is currently Treasurer of the Science Club.

NON CREDIT COURSES TO BE OFFERED. ISUE Office of Continuing Education will be offering six noncredit courses this spring. The courses are reading improvement, psychological aspects of contemporary living, color coordinating for interior design, fundamentals of black and white photography, gymnastics for children and young adults, and genealogy.

READING IMPROVEMENT is a course for persons with average reading ability who wish to develop greater reading efficiency. The course is designed to improve basic reading skills including vocabulary, paragraph analysis, comprehension, and speed. Fee includes cost of instructional material. Enrollment is limited. The instructor will be *Janet Venatta*, Associate Professor of Education. The class will meet for ten Wednesdays, March 5-May 7, 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the Library, Room 105. Registration fee is \$25.00.

PSYCHOLOGICAL ASPECTS OF CONTEMPORARY LIVING is an applied psychology course designed to provide information and experiences that relate to personal, family, and every day living. Beginning with a consideration of such popular items as ESP, subliminal perception, dreams and hypnosis, the course will consider individual development, family relationships, and interpersonal communication. In addition, the course will focus on personal experiences such as sexual behavior, self-acceptance, and social behavior. No background in psychology is required. The instructors will be *Susan Donaldson*, Asst. Professor of Psychology, and *Janet Wyatt*, Instructor of Psychology. The class will meet for eight Tuesdays, March 4-April 29 (class will not meet March 25), 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the University Center, Room 351. Registration fee is \$25.00.

COLOR COORDINATING FOR INTERIOR DESIGN will introduce and explain uses of color systems, arrangements, and organization. A prime objective of the course is to improve your living environment through understanding of how, why, and where colors look good together. Furnishings, draperies, wall papers, and carpet selection will be discussed by visiting professionals. The instructor will be *Jack Cascione*, Asst. Professor of Art. The class will meet eight Wednesdays, March 5-April 30 (omit March 26), 6:30-9:30 p.m. in CL 193. The registration fee is \$25.00.

NON CREDIT COURSES, CONTINUED.

FUNDAMENTALS OF BLACK AND WHITE PHOTOGRAPHY is designed to introduce persons with no background in photography to the mechanical procedures of basic black and white photography. The course covers practical application of basic camera types, picture taking, exposure determination, and processing of negatives and prints. Participants must bring camera to first class. Enrollment is limited. The instructor will be *John Dawson*, Production Manager, Instructional Media Center. The class will meet for eight Mondays, March 3-April 28, 7:00-9:30 p.m. in Room A127. The registration fee is \$35.00.

GYMNASTICS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS is a course in fundamental gymnastics to provide opportunities for each participant (1) to develop or expand a gymnastic skill repertoire on specific pieces of apparatus, and (2) to develop or expand an interest in and understanding of the sport of gymnastics. There will be two sections of the course. Section 1, for boys and girls ages 7-10, will include the following activities: trampoline, balance beam, tumbling, and uneven parallel bars. Section 2, for ages 11 and older, will include the above activities in addition to even parallel bars and vaulting. Participants should wear appropriate gymnastic clothing. The instructor will be *Jane Davis*, Instructor in Physical Education. The class will meet for eight Tuesdays, February 25-April 22 (no class March 25) according to these times:

Section 1 (ages 7-10), 6:00-7:00 p.m.

Section 2 (ages 11 and up), 7:30-8:30 p.m. in the Forum

Registration fee is \$20.00.

GENEALOGY: TRACING YOUR FAMILY TREE is a course designed for the beginner who wants to learn how to go about tracing his "family tree," as well as for those already engaged in the search. It includes an introduction to genealogy, with emphasis on the validity of records, location of records, and the kinds of records acceptable as evidence in establishing genealogies. Other topics to be covered are beginning research, notekeeping and organization, use of resources such as county and federal records, library and church materials, and migration and maps. Fee includes cost of research packet. The instructor will be *Mrs. Eileen Stoltz*. Class will meet for ten Thursdays, March 6-May 8, 7:00-9:00 p.m. in the University Center, Room 351. Registration fee is \$25.00.

Open to anyone, regardless of educational background, the courses are presented in a noncompetitive, informal atmosphere where interest in learning is the primary consideration. No grades are assigned, no academic credit is given, and formal admission to the University is not required. Call *Ed Jones*, Director of Continuing Education, on Extension 363 for applications.

EAGLE GRAN PRIX. The Eagle Gran Prix Committee has named *John Ferrell* as Chief Steward of the Eagle Gran Prix. As Chief Steward, *John* will be directing all phases of the 30-mile bicycle race.

Don't forget the rapidly approaching deadline for team entries is Friday, February 28. Entry forms must be turned in with the \$10.00 entry fee before 5:00 p.m. to the information desk in the University Center. Although team lists must consist of at least three riders who are presently enrolled students, the names can be changed prior to time trials. Due to the increase in cost of bike rental, entry fees are not refundable.

This year's EAGLE GRAN PRIX will be run on a one-quarter mile dirt track surrounding the multipurpose playfield. The races will again feature five-mile faculty-administration and women's race and a 30-mile men's race. In addition, this year's big race offers another new feature. If more than 25 teams enter the race, the time trials on the Saturday before the race will determine the top 25 competitors as well as their starting position, and only 25 teams will be allowed to compete in the 30-mile EAGLE GRAN PRIX.

In summary, teams must be entered before February 28, time trials are set for April 19, and the big EAGLE GRAN PRIX is on Saturday, April 26, here on the ISUE campus.

CAMPUS ORGANIZATIONS.

The ISUE History Club, organized on campus six years ago, was formed for the purpose of giving students and faculty a forum for the discussion of matters of historical concern.

A very active organization, the History Club has brought various speakers and programs of a cultural nature to the campus. These programs contribute in a major way to the academic and cultural atmosphere of the University and the Evansville community. Over the past year and a half, programs have included a series of German propaganda films, a rebuttal by Dr. R.V. Schoder to the controversial thesis of ancient astronauts from space landing on earth, a slide program on the U.S.S.R., field trips to Ball State University and another to DePauw University on ancient history--just to name a few.

Membership in the History Club numbers near 50 and is open to any interested full or part-time ISUE student. Each member receives a free subscription to a literary and historical journal, The Intercollegiate Review.

Current faculty advisor of the ISUE History Club is *Daniel Scavone*, Associate Professor of History. Officers for the 1974-75 year are President, *Susan Hudson*; Vice-President, *Branson Hart*; Secretary, *Susan Mounts*; and Treasurer, *Rapina Robinson*.

Plans for 1975 include a Medieval Conference which members will attend on March 22 and 23.

ISUE STUDENT HONORED. ISUE senior *John Heumann* has been named Cadet Corp Commander of Air Force ROTC at the joint program offered at ISUE and University of Evansville. As Corp Commander, *John* will be in charge of ten weeks of training of the cadets. The honor was based on his past performance and potential for success. *John* is the first ISUE student to receive such an honor.
