

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This fuchsia thistle is one of the many plants that flourish in the Adopt-A-Spot tended by Debbie and Bob Goedde.

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
University laurels:

USI captures
OCB honors

Honored for its ongoing support of Operation City Beautiful and dedication to maintaining an attractive campus, USI received OCB's Business of the Year award in October.

"The Business of the Year is awarded by the board of OCB to businesses that go above and beyond the call of duty," said **Ms. Kalah Jerstad**, the organization's executive director.

The University was responsible for the first campus-wide Adopt-A-Spot program, Jerstad explained. USI also has hosted the Tour de Bloom, a fund-raising bicycle ride, and landscape symposiums. It has supported new programs and fund-raising efforts, and has established "outstanding grounds maintenance."

Leadership provided by **Mrs. Sherrianne Standley**, vice president for Advancement, also was a factor in the organization's decision-making process.

"You couple that all together, and that warrants a Business of the Year," Jerstad said.

Standley, a former OCB board chair, captured an individual honor as well. The organization awarded her lifetime membership, a recognition bestowed only seven times before in OCB's history. She has belonged to the organization since 1985.

"At the end of her chairmanship, she was dubbed 'Miss Enthusiasm,' because at every board meeting she was just a ball of enthusiasm, and everyone just loved being around her," Jerstad said. "Certainly, this was long overdue for Sherrianne."

USI alumna **Debbie Goedde** and her husband **Bob** also shared in the awards. The couple received OCB's Adopt-A-Spot Volunteer of the Year Award, honoring their two-year cultivation of the spot in the median near the Technology Center and Art Studio on campus.

"They surpassed all expectations," Jerstad said. "It's just amazing the energy they put into that spot.... They're always there."

Founded in 1972, OCB is a private not-for-profit organization dedicated to community beautification. It is a special committee of the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce.

WSWI celebrating 20th anniversary

WSWI AM-820, the University's radio station, will celebrate its 20th anniversary Saturday, November 3.

South Central Communications, the parent organization of radio station WIKY in Evansville, gave USI the 250-watt radio station as a learning tool for students in 1981. Since then, radio and television majors as well as other students have worked at the daytime-only media outlet.

The WSWI staff consists of paid students, students earning credit, and student volunteers. All work to create the sound of AM-820, WSWI, and many former WSWI workers are now employed at commercial radio and television stations.

"It is always exciting to see the students get on the air for the first time, and then improve over time," said **Mr. John Morris**, general manager and instructor in radio and television.

"Some gain a love for radio that they never before imagined. No matter where they go professionally, they gain by working at the station by improved communication, learning to work with others, and having responsibilities."

The station, now known as The Modern Rock Revolution, has undergone several changes since it first signed on with a program of classical, big band, and jazz music.

In 1983 WSWI switched to a rock-and-roll format, and since then the music has become even more targeted. The station now features alternative rock on weekdays, while weekends offer a more eclectic mix as student disc jockeys choose what they like to play. Their selections have featured pop, hip-hop, Christian music, and local bands.

Open enrollment

Employees currently enrolled in the flexible spending account program must complete a new election form for 2002. Memos and election forms will be sent via campus mail to current participants.

Employees also may enroll in the voluntary group term life insurance program that allows employees to purchase additional term life insurance for themselves, a spouse, and/or dependent children at low group rates with a payroll deduction.

All open enrollment materials must be returned to the Human Resources Department by Wednesday, November 21.

An Open Enrollment Fair will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Thursday, November 8, in the University Conference Center. Representatives from Anthem Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Welborn Health Plans, Health Resources Inc., BKD (formerly Olive LLP), and TransAmerica Life Assurance Company will be available to provide additional information and address questions or concerns.

Sports also have always been a part of WSWI. The station will carry more than 100 games this season as its staff covers men's and women's soccer, men's and women's basketball, and baseball.

In spring 2000, WSWI began carrying its signal on the Internet, which created additional student opportunities since Internet broadcasts can continue after the "terrestrial" station has signed off the air. The radio station also is carried on the University's cable network.

Web tips

The Office of Intramural and Recreational Sports has added new functions and services for students to its Web site. The updated site includes a comprehensive list of events and an intramural league schedule that are automatically supplied with information from a database maintained by office staff.

Information available on the list includes who is playing, the dates, and how many points can be earned by participants.

The league schedule lists various sports, game schedules, and team records.

By adding these pages to its site, Intramural and Recreational Sports can provide event information that is accessible to students around-the-clock and in their homes. Keeping the latest information online about student teams, activities, schedule changes, and rain dates will allow students to check the information regularly and stay up-to-date.

The office's new online services also are expected to decrease the number of walk-in inquiries as well as e-mail questions and telephone calls.

Students are required to participate in Assessment Day and will be notified by mail of the time and place of their testing.


Michigan writer to speak at USI

USI's RopeWalk Reading Series will feature **author Thomas Watson** at 7 p.m. Thursday, November 15, in Kleymeyer Auditorium in the Liberal Arts Center.

His short story collection, *See Rock City and Other Stories*, placed as a semi-finalist in the 2001 Julia Peterkin Prize competition, and his most recent essay, "The Bug Beacon," appeared in *Peninsula: Essays and Memoirs from Michigan*, which Michigan State University Press published last year.

Watson lives near Grand Rapids, Michigan, where he teaches writing to at-risk students as well as an on-line graduate creative writing course for educators through Indiana University. He received an M.F.A. in writing from Vermont College, and his stories have appeared in numerous magazines and journals, including the *Southern Indiana Review*.

A book signing at the USI Bookstore will follow Watson's reading. The School of Liberal Arts sponsors the free series.
