**DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR AWARD.** The Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee announces that a Distinguished Professor Award, an honor that may be conferred on any full-time, voting member of the ISUE faculty, has been created. **LITTLE MURDERS OPENS NOVEMBER 11.** The ISUE Theatre will present Jules Feiffer's Little Murders beginning Thursday, November 11, at 8:00 p.m. Performances are scheduled for November 11 through 13 and 18 through 20 at 8:00 p.m. each night. General admission tickets are \$3.00; students and senior citizens will be admitted for \$2.50. Group rates are available for 10 or more people.

On the surface, the play deals with typical, familiar tensions of an urban family--the Newquists. The events depicted are not unusual. Patsy, the 27-year-old daughter, brings home a fiance, Alfred, who doesn't meet with her family's approval. The Newquist family then becomes involved with Patsy and Alfred's courtship and wedding. In various forms, violence touches the lives of all the characters. The sub-surface targets of Feiffer's satire are the attitudes and beliefs of the middle class family unit that unconsciously foster and perpetuate the violence that victimizes them.

In Best American Plays (7th Series), Clive Barnes said of the play, "It is a striking play that is both funny and bitter. Its corrosive portraits of American archetypes and its casual killings are horrifying and yet maintain the good-natured tone of a TV soap opera. It is perhaps this tone--even, level, and convincing--that is the play's final horror and achievement."

**MATH CONTEST ON SATURDAY.** The ninth annual ISUE Math Contest will be held on Saturday, November 13. All area high school math students who are taking geometry or a more advanced math course have been invited to participate.

**MATH CONTEST (continued).** Students participating in the contest will compete only with students from other schools who are taking the same math courses. For example, geometry students will compete with other geometry students. The contest will include two parts-- a 30-question written exam and a mathorama in which three participants work together.

Students will be served lunch and will have an opportunity to meet the ISUE mathematics faculty and use ISUE's recreational facilities. Registration will begin at 9:15 in the morning, and awards will be presented at 2:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

Entrants will compete in the following categories--Broadcasting, Discussion, Boys' Extemporaneous, Girls' Extemporaneous, Dramatic, Humorous and Oratorical Interpretation, Impromptu, Original Oratory, and Poetry. Ribbons will be awarded to the top five speakers in each category. Trophies will be presented to the schools with the highest number of points. Judges for the meet will include ISUE Communications students and coaches from the represented high schools.

Dead trees may be felled and split for firewood. All branches from trees taken are to be removed with the firewood. No cutting for resale is allowed. Woodcutters are to register with the University's grounds crew at the Physical Plant and obtain a permit on each wood-cutting day.

NOVEMBER HUMANITIES FORUM EVENTS. ISUE will sponsor three Humanities Forum events during the month of November. All of the events are free and open to the public.

Dr. Chris Giannous, a Canadian physician, will speak on Thursday, November 11, at 7:30 p.m., in UC350. The Toronto native will tell of his experiences as a physician working for the Red Crescent, an affiliate of the International Red Cross, at a hospital in Sidon, Lebanon. He was taken prisoner by the Israeli Defense Forces after they destroyed Sidon and Ain el Kelwi refugee camp. Detailed accounts of Dr. Giannou's experiences can be found in the August issue of New Society.

Ms. Elizabeth Libbey, a former poet-in-residence at the Ohio River Writers' Conference, will return to ISUE on Wednesday, November 17. At 1:00 p.m., she will present a reading of her poetry in Forum Three. Ms. Libbey received her MFA from the Iowa Writers' Workshop. She is the author of two collections of poetry--The Crowd Inside and Songs of a Returning Soul.

Mr. Clark Kissinger, a political journalist, will speak on Monday, November 29. Kissinger is a contributing writer to the Revolutionary Worker and covers the State Department and foreign affairs. The Henderson, Kentucky native earned baccalaureate and master's degrees in 1960 and 1962 from the University of Chicago. During the 1960s, he served a term as national secretary of Students for a Democratic Society. His lecture will begin at 10:00 a.m. in UC351.

NUCLEAR ARMS IS SUBJECT OF CONVOCATION DAY. A Union of Concerned Scientists will sponsor a program about the nuclear arms race on Thursday, November 11, at ISUE. More than 500 colleges and universities will be observing this Convocation Day calling attention to the futility of the nuclear arms race.

Literature about nuclear arms will be available in the University Center Lounge. A 30-minute film entitled "No First Use: Preventing Nuclear War" will be shown at 2:00 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. in UC350. A discussion is planned, and maps showing the vulnerability levels of the Evansville area, if it is attacked by nuclear weapons, will be distributed.



TELEPHONE TIP FOR THE WEEK

The Dimension feature "Answer Hold" permits a party to answer a waiting call without terminating the existing call. Follow these steps:



1. When a call waiting tone is heard (two beeps only), ask the first party to hold.
2. Depress the switchhook.
3. When the dial tone is received, dial code 52 and the waiting call will be connected.
4. Complete the conversation and hang up.
5. The phone will ring and the first party will be reconnected to the line.

To send a call waiting tone to a busy telephone, just follow these steps:

1. Listen for dial tone, and dial code 53.
2. After hearing another dial tone, dial the desired extension number.
3. A special ring will be heard. Wait for an answer.
